MTR VEHICLE/DRIVER LIC: Provides relative to the issuance and possession of drivers' licenses

Synopsis of Senate Amendments

- 1. Removes the provision that clarifies that a law enforcement officer or a representative of the department is authorized to require a person produce his physical driver's license issued by the department if he is stopped for a reason other than a traffic stop or checkpoint.
- 2. Establishes a fee, not to exceed six dollars, for the installation of the application to display a digitized driver's license.
- 3. Makes technical changes.

Digest of Bill as Finally Passed by Senate

<u>Present law</u> requires that a licensee have his license in his immediate possession at all times when driving a motor vehicle.

<u>Proposed law</u> modifies <u>present law</u> by authorizing a licensee to have a digitized driver's license provided by the Dept. of Public Safety and Corrections, office of motor vehicles, as an alternative to his physical license.

<u>Proposed law</u> defines digitized driver's license as a data file available on any mobile device that has connectivity to the internet through an application, which allows the mobile device to download the data file from the department or an authorized representative of the department, contains all of the data elements visible on the face and back of the physical license and the current status of the license and provides that a copy, photograph, or image of a driver's license not downloaded through the application on a mobile device is not a valid digitized driver's license.

<u>Proposed law</u> prohibits issuance of a citation, in connection with a traffic stop or checkpoint, for driving a motor vehicle without a valid license in his possession if a person presents a digitized driver's license to a law enforcement officer in lieu of a physical driver's license issued by the department.

<u>Proposed law</u> authorizes a law enforcement officer or a representative of the department to require a person to produce the physical driver's license issued by the department, except as provided for in <u>proposed law</u>, and provides that the failure to produce such physical driver's license subjects the person to all applicable laws and consequences for failure to produce such license.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires the department to establish rules necessary to implement a digitized driver's license.

<u>Proposed law</u> specifies that display of a digitized driver's license does not serve as consent or authorization for a law enforcement officer, or any other person, to view, search, or access any other data or application on the mobile device and requires that a law enforcement officer promptly return the mobile device to the person once he has had an opportunity to verify the identity and license status.

Proposed law establishes a fee to install the application to display a digitized driver's license,

as provided in proposed law, not exceed six dollars.

<u>Present law</u> requires the secretary of the Dept. of Public Safety and Corrections to issue evidence of renewal of Class "D" or "E" drivers' licenses, which must be affixed to the previously issued license, to indicate the date the license expires in the future when a license is renewed by mail or electronic commerce.

<u>Proposed law</u> modifies <u>present law</u> by requiring the secretary to issue a new license which indicates the new expiration date when a license is renewed by mail or electronic commerce.
