DRUGS/PRESCRIPTION: Requires, with limited exceptions, that prescribers transmit prescriptions for drugs to pharmacies electronically

AN ACT

2	To enact R.S. 37:1701.1 through 1701.3, relative to electronic prescriptions; to provide for
3	duties of prescription prescribers; to provide for mandatory electronic prescriptions;
4	to provide for the duties of the Louisiana Board of Medical Examiners, Louisiana
5	Board of Pharmacy, and the Louisiana Board of Dentistry; to provide for exceptions;
6	to provide for penalties, to provide for rules and regulations; and to provide for
7	related matters.
8	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
9	Section 1. R.S. 37:1701.1 through 1701.3 are hereby enacted to read as follows:
0	§1701.1. Electronic prescriptions
1	Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, no physician surgeon, optometrist.
12	medical psychologist, dentist or any other prescriber, shall issue any prescription in
13	this state unless such prescription is generated by electronic prescription from the
4	prescriber issuing the prescription to a pharmacy.
15	§1701.2. Exceptions
16	A. The prescribing of electronic prescriptions shall not apply to prescriptions
17	issued:
18	(1) By veterinarians.
9	(2) In circumstances where electronic prescribing is not available due to
20	temporary technological or electrical failure.

1	(3) By a practitioner to be dispensed by a pharmacy located outside the

7	(6) By a practitioner for a drug that the federal Food and Drug
8	Administration requires the prescription to contain certain elements that are not able
9	to be accomplished with electronic prescribing.
10	(7) By a practitioner allowing for the dispensing of a non-patient specific
11	prescription pursuant to a standing order, approved protocol for drug therapy,
12	collaborative drug management or comprehensive medication management, in
13	response to a public health emergency, or other circumstances where the practitioner
14	may issue a non-patient specific prescription.
15	(8) By a practitioner prescribing a drug under a research protocol.
16	(9) By practitioners who have received a waiver or a renewal thereof from
17	the requirement to use electronic prescribing.
18	(10) By a practitioner under circumstances where, notwithstanding the
19	practitioner's present ability to make an electronic prescription as required by this
20	Subsection, such practitioner reasonably determines that it would be impractical for
21	the patient to obtain substances prescribed by electronic prescription in a timely
22	manner, and such delay would adversely impact the patient's medical condition.
23	B. Pharmacists may continue to dispense medications from otherwise valid
24	written, oral or facsimile prescriptions that are consistent with current state laws and
25	regulations.
26	C.(1) An individual who violates the provisions of this Section shall be fined
27	two-hundred fifty dollars per violation, not to exceed five thousand dollars in one
28	calendar year.

1 (2) Provisions of this Section shall be enforced by the Louisiana Board of 2 Medical Examiners, Louisiana Board of Pharmacy, and the Louisiana Board of 3 Dentistry. §1701.3. Rules and regulations 4 5 Louisiana Board of Medical Examiners, Louisiana Board of Pharmacy, and the Louisiana Board of Dentistry shall promulgate rules and regulations in 6 7 accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, and take such other actions as are 8 necessary to implement the provisions of this Section.

Abstract: Requires prescribers to transmit drug prescriptions to pharmacies electronically.

Proposed law requires prescribers of drug prescriptions to transmit request electronically.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides the following as exceptions to electronic prescriptions:

- (1) Veterinarians.
- (2) Circumstances where electronic prescribing is not available due to temporary technological or electrical failure.
- (3) By a practitioner to be dispensed by a pharmacy located outside the state.
- (4) When the prescriber and dispenser are the same entity.
- (5) Elements that are not supported by the most recently implemented version of the National Council for Prescription Drug Programs Prescriber/Pharmacist Interface SCRIPT Standard.
- (6) Issued by a practitioner for a drug that the federal Food and Drug Administration requires the prescription to contain certain elements that are not able to be accomplished with electronic prescribing.
- (7) By a practitioner allowing for the dispensing of a non-patient specific prescription pursuant to a standing order, approved protocol for drug therapy, collaborative drug management or comprehensive medication management, in response to a public health emergency, or other circumstances where the practitioner may issue a non-patient specific prescription.
- (8) By a practitioner prescribing a drug under a research protocol.
- (9) By practitioners who have received a waiver or a renewal thereof from the requirement to use electronic prescribing.

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(10) By a practitioner under circumstances where, notwithstanding the practitioner's present ability to make an electronic prescription as required by this Subsection, such practitioner reasonably determines that it would be impractical for the patient to obtain substances prescribed by electronic prescription in a timely manner, and such delay would adversely impact the patient's medical condition

<u>Proposed law</u> adds a fine of \$250 per violation of violators of this provision. The fine shall not exceed \$1000.

<u>Proposed law</u> places the duty of enforcement of <u>proposed law</u> on the Louisiana Board of Medical Examiners, Louisiana Board of Pharmacy, and the Louisiana Board of Dentistry.

Proposed law allows the boards to establish rules to carry out proposed law.
