SCHOOLS: Provides relative to administration of medication in public schools

| 15 | (4) For the purposes of this Subsection: |
| 16 | (a) "Auto-injectable epinephrine" "Epinephrine" means a medical device for |
| 17 | the immediate self-administration of epinephrine by a person at risk for anaphylaxis |
| 18 | measured, single dose of epinephrine that is used to treat a person suffering a |
| 19 | potentially life-threatening anaphylactic reaction. |

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| (5) A student who has been granted permission to self-administer medication |
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| pursuant to this Subsection shall be allowed to carry and store with the school nurse |
| or other designated school official an inhaler or auto-injectable epinephrine, or both, |
| at all times. |

- (6) Permission for the self-administration of asthma medications or use of auto-injectable epinephrine by a student shall be effective only for the school year in which permission is granted. Permission for self-administration of asthma medications or the use of auto-injectable epinephrine by a student shall be granted each subsequent school year, provided all of the requirements of this Subsection are fulfilled.
- (7) Upon obtaining permission to self-administer asthma medication or to use auto-injectable epinephrine pursuant to this Subsection, a student shall be permitted to possess and self-administer such prescribed medication at any time while on school property or while attending a school sponsored activity.

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- K.(1) Notwithstanding any provision of law or any rule, regulation, or policy to the contrary, the governing authority of each public elementary and secondary school shall adopt a policy authorizing a school nurse or trained school employee to administer auto-injectable epinephrine, as defined in Subparagraph (J)(4)(a) of this Section, to a student who the school nurse or trained school employee, in good faith, professionally believes is having an anaphylactic reaction, whether or not such student has a prescription for epinephrine. At least one employee at each school shall receive training from a registered nurse or a licensed medical physician in the administration of auto-injectable epinephrine. The school nurse or trained employee may administer the auto-injectable epinephrine to respond to a student's anaphylactic reaction, under a standing protocol from a physician licensed to practice medicine in the state.
- (2) Each public elementary and secondary school may maintain a supply of auto-injectable epinephrine at the school in a locked, secure, and easily accessible

location. A licensed physician may prescribe epinephrine auto-injectors in the name of the school system or the individual school to be maintained for use when deemed necessary pursuant to the provisions of this Subsection.

Abstract: Provides relative to the administration of medication in public schools.

<u>Present law</u> provides for requirements and restrictions relative to the administration of medication to public school students and defines "medication" as all prescription and nonprescription drugs. Proposed law retains present law.

<u>Present law</u> requires the governing authority of each public school to adopt a policy authorizing a school nurse to administer auto-injectable epinephrine to a student who the school nurse, in good faith, professionally believes is having an anaphylactic reaction, whether or not such a student has a prescription for epinephrine.

<u>Present law</u> requires that at least one employee at each school receive training from a registered nurse or a licensed physician in the administration of auto-injectable epinephrine. Authorizes the school nurse or trained employee to administer the auto-injectable epinephrine in response to a student's anaphylactic reaction under a standing protocol from a physician licensed to practice in this state.

<u>Present law</u> authorizes each public school to maintain a supply of epinephrine at the school in a locked, secure, and easily accessible location. Further provides that a licensed physician may prescribe epinephrine auto-injectors in the name of the school system or the individual school.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> but removes all references to "auto-injectable" and "auto-injectors".
