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SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 205

BY SENATORS MIZELL, BARROW, CLOUD, HEWITT, JACKSON AND FRED MILLS

CHILDREN. Requests the Senate Select Committee on Women and Children to conduct research to ascertain the efficacy of the program available and funds allocated to meet the needs of the children of the state.

A RESOLUTION

2	To urge and request the Senate Select Committee on Women and Children to conduct
3	ongoing research to ascertain the efficacy of the current programs available and
4	funds allocated in meeting the needs of children of the state and to make
5	recommendations for changes that will improve outcomes, minimize duplication of
6	services, and fill any gaps in services necessary to promote child well-being.
7	WHEREAS, there are over one million children in the state of Louisiana who are the
8	state's greatest asset and whose well-being is critical to the state's future; and
9	WHEREAS, Louisiana ranks 48th overall among states in child well-being, 46th in
10	child mortality, and 49th in infant mortality; and
11	WHEREAS, almost thirty percent of Louisiana's children live in poverty, twenty
12	percent live in high-poverty areas of the state, and these numbers have risen during the
13	COVID-19 pandemic; and
14	WHEREAS, growing up in poverty is one of the greatest threats to healthy child
15	development, which impacts the entire trajectory of a child's life; and
16	WHEREAS, many children in our state do not have a safe home environment
17	including hundreds of children who are victims of sex trafficking every year; and
18	WHEREAS, the children of Louisiana are in need of a variety of services including

1	physical and i	mental health care services, meal assistance, tutorial programs, educational		
2	services, mentorship, scholarships, social development programs, community development,			
3	and housing assistance; and			
4	WHER	REAS, billions of dollars in state and federal funds are expended annually on		
5	programs for o	children in this state; and		
6	WHEF	REAS, numerous state departments of Louisiana provide a variety of services		
7	to the states' c	hildren using several of funding sources; and		
8	WHEREAS, the legislature also appropriates monies to a myriad of nongovernmental			
9	programs as a	mechanism to provide additional services to children; and		
10	WHEF	REAS, there is not currently a system in place to measure the outcomes of the		
11	various progra	ams and services; and		
12	WHEF	REAS, the Senate of the Legislature of Louisiana recognizes its fiduciary		
13	responsibility to the citizens of the state, particularly the state's youngest citizens, to make			
14	the best use of our limited financial resources; and			
15	WHEREAS, by investing wisely in our children, we can have a significant impact			
16	on the trajectory of our citizens' lives and have lifelong impacts in every dimension of their			
17	life, from physical and mental health to educational attainment and labor market success.			
18	THER	EFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Senate Select Committee on Women and		
19	Children meet	regularly and conduct research on:		
20	(1)	Access to children's basic needs such as clean water, nutritious food, safe		
21		shelter, healthcare, and education.		
22	(2)	Access to resources that promote healthy development and promote the well-		
23		being of all the state's children regardless of socioeconomic status.		
24	(3)	Access to children's services through every region of the state including the		
25		variations of access between the urban and rural areas of the state.		
26	(4)	The value of the development of a regional approach to the provision of		
27		services that promote child well-being.		
28	(5)	Current policies and programs intended to reduce child poverty and improve		
29		child well-being outcomes.

5	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee establish the scope of the study,		
6	necessary areas of expertise and consultation not available through state resources, and		
7	identify the potential cost to conduct the committee's work and deliberations.		
8	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee obtain input from the National		
9	Conference on State Legislatures, the Southern Legislative Conference, the Children's		
10	Cabinet, all state agencies that are included in the Children's Budget, nongovernmental		
11	organizations including faith-based organizations that receive governmental funding to		
12	provide services to children, and any other entity, person, or organization that will assist the		
13	committee in its research.		
14	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Senate, the legislative fiscal office, and the		
15	legislative auditor shall provide staff support to the committee in its research.		
16	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall provide an initial report to		
17	the legislature on or before March 1, 2023 and that the report shall include, at a minimum,		
18	next steps to study.
