CRIME/PUNISHMENT. Increases the maximum time of incarceration for aggravated flight from an officer. (8/1/24)

AN ACT

2	To amend and reenact R.S. 14:108.1(E), relative to offenses affecting law enforcement; to
3	provide relative to the crime of aggravated flight from an officer; to increase the
4	penalties for aggravated flight from an officer; and to provide for related matters.
5	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
6	Section 1. R.S. 14:108.1(E) is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
7	§108.1. Flight from an officer; aggravated flight from an officer
8	* * *
9	E.(1) Whoever Except as provided in Paragraph (2) of this Subsection,
10	whoever commits aggravated flight from an officer shall be imprisoned at hard labor
11	for not more than five ten years and may be fined not more than two thousand
12	dollars.
13	(2)(a) Whoever commits the crime of aggravated flight from an officer that
14	results in serious bodily injury shall be imprisoned at hard labor for not more than
15	ten fifteen years and may be fined not more than two thousand dollars.

<u>Present law</u> defines aggravated flight from an officer as the intentional refusal of a driver to bring a vehicle to a stop or of an operator to bring a watercraft to a stop, under circumstances wherein human life is endangered, knowing that he has been given a visual and audible signal to stop by a police officer when the officer has reasonable grounds to believe that the driver or operator has committed an offense.

Proposed law retains present law.

<u>Present law</u> provides that aggravated flight from an officer is punishable by imprisonment at hard labor for up to five years and in addition a possible fine of up to \$2,000.

<u>Proposed law</u> increases the maximum period of imprisonment <u>from</u> five years <u>to</u> ten years and otherwise retains present law.

<u>Present law</u> provides that aggravated flight from an officer when the offense results in serious bodily injury is punishable by imprisonment at hard labor for up to ten years and in addition a possible fine of up to \$2,000.

<u>Proposed law</u> increases the maximum period of imprisonment when serious bodily injury occurs <u>from</u> ten years <u>to</u> 15 years and otherwise retains <u>present law</u>.

Effective August 1, 2024.
