WHEREAS, her teaching assignments included Our Lady of Grace in Reserve; St. Paul the Apostle, All Saints, St. Raymond, Corpus Christi, Marian Central, and House of the Holy Family in New Orleans; St. Francis of Assisi in Breaux Bridge; St. Paul's in Lafayette; Marksville Catholic in Marksville; Holy Family in Tulsa, Oklahoma; and Sacred Heart in Belize; and

WHEREAS, Sister Innocenté remains deeply grateful to the parishioners of Notre Dame Catholic Church and the community of St. Martinville, whose prayers and support have accompanied her throughout her spiritual journey, and she in turn prays daily for them and for all her former students; and

WHEREAS, her eighty years of religious life are a shining example of humble service, spiritual strength, and educational leadership.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Senate of the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby commend and honor Sister Mary Innocenté Wiltz for her extraordinary life of service to the Church, her students, and to her community, and extends its deepest appreciation for the radiant legacy she has built through her faith, devotion, and compassionate leadership.
