SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 181

COMMENDATIONS. To commend the Louisiana Association of Business and Industry (LABI) on the occasion of its fiftieth anniversary.

A RESOLUTION

2	To commend the Louisiana Association of Business and Industry (LABI) on the occasion
3	of its fiftieth anniversary for its outstanding service to Louisiana's business
4	community, promoting free enterprise, and fostering a climate for economic growth
5	through engagement in the political, legislative, judicial, and regulatory processes.
6	WHEREAS, LABI is widely regarded as Louisiana's premier business lobbying
7	organization, and celebrates its fiftieth anniversary in 2025; and
8	WHEREAS, LABI was established on September 4, 1975, by consolidating the
9	Louisiana State Chamber of Commerce, the Louisiana Manufacturers Association, and the
10	Louisiana Political Council, uniting their memberships, resources, and staff; and
11	WHEREAS, LABI's board of directors selected then executive director of the Public
12	Affairs Research Council, Ed Steimel, to lead the organization as its first president; and
13	WHEREAS, the organization's first major task was the herculean challenge of
14	seeking enactment of a Right-to-Work law, an effort many political observers at the time
15	predicted would take years to achieve, yet LABI on its first attempt spearheaded and
16	obtained the successful passage of that law; and
17	WHEREAS, during the latter half of the 1970s, LABI sought to build on this success
18	by expanding its advocacy efforts on issues important to the business community,

particularly in the areas of labor and taxation law, and began engaging in legislative elections; and

WHEREAS, on three separate occasions when the state's unemployment compensation trust fund became insolvent, LABI played a leadership role in working with the legislature and governor to address the fund's collapse and restoration, preventing a major federal tax increase for Louisiana's businesses in each instance; the first being in the 1980s when massive layoffs in Louisiana's oil and gas sector created an \$800 million obligation to the federal unemployment system for loans used to pay benefits; the second occurring after Hurricane Katrina in 2005, which caused the dislocation of workers and their employers in the New Orleans region, generating a federal debt exceeding \$400 million; and finally, in 2020 when the COVID-19 outbreak shut down commerce across the country and forced Louisiana's fund once again into insolvency, resulting in close to \$200 million in federal debt; and

WHEREAS, upon Steimel's retirement in 1988, Dan Juneau succeeded him as LABI's president; and

WHEREAS, under Juneau's leadership, LABI invested effort in education, championing accountability and choice in addition to helping to create the Community and Technical College System, while developing and bringing about the passage of bills that served to restore an eroding workers' compensation insurance market, as well as those that brought about major legal reform, and finally promoting a reorganization of Louisiana's workforce delivery system to better connect employers and prospective employees; and

WHEREAS, in 2013, Stephen Waguespack became LABI president following Juneau's retirement; and

WHEREAS, under Waguespack's leadership, LABI defended businesses against numerous and perennial attacks on labor, legal, and taxation fronts, all while playing a pivotal role in the enactment of significant legal and educational improvements; and

WHEREAS, in 2023, following Waguespack's departure, Will Green was appointed as his successor; and

WHEREAS, under Green's leadership, LABI has honored its legacy while strategically focusing on the future through the implementation of its LA Driven Strategic

1	Plan to advance a vibrant and sustainable business climate in Louisiana by championing free
2	enterprise to create economic opportunities and enhance the quality of life for all citizens;

4	WHEREAS, LABI has diligently protected Louisiana's businesses against
5	unwarranted governmental disruption to their ability to operate efficiently and productively;
6	and
7	WHEREAS, many LABI alumni staff members have continued their careers working
8	within Louisiana's governmental processes to improve our state; and
9	WHEREAS, LABI has earned numerous awards and national recognition for its work
10	in Louisiana and its leadership in service to other chambers of commerce and manufacturing
11	associations across the United States, in collaboration with its national partners the U.S.
12	Chamber of Commerce and the National Association of Manufacturers; and
13	WHEREAS, for fifty years LABI has served as an able and effective advocate for
14	its members and non-members within Louisiana's business community; those of all sizes,
15	from all business and industry sectors, and from all around the state; and
16	WHEREAS, for five decades, LABI has annually been in the forefront of efforts to
17	improve Louisiana's business environment by advocating for the reformation and
18	stabilization of the state's budget and tax systems, correcting inequities in its civil justice
19	system, strengthening its energy sector, enhancing its education and training delivery and
20	outcomes, safeguarding employers' ability to provide employment opportunities for workers,
21	and advocating on so many other issues too numerous to recite in this Resolution, all for the
22	purpose of promoting business investment and job growth within our state.
23	THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Senate of the Legislature of Louisiana
24	does hereby extend its sincere congratulations and best wishes to the Louisiana Association
25	of Business and Industry on the occasion of its fiftieth anniversary and commends its five
26	decades of outstanding service and accomplishments in support of the state of Louisiana and
27	its business community.
