A RESOLUTION

2	To urge and request the Congress of the United States to enact legislation authorizing	
3	reimbursement to states that use non-federal funds to continue providing	
4	Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits during a federal	
5	government shutdown.	
6	WHEREAS, SNAP is a federally funded benefit administered through the United	
7	States Department of Agriculture (USDA) that provides essential food assistance to	
8	low-income individuals and families in Louisiana; and	
9	WHEREAS, approximately eight hundred thousand Louisiana residents rely on	
10	SNAP each month, representing a lifeline for children, seniors, and persons with disabilities;	
11	and	
12	WHEREAS, SNAP benefits risk suspension due to a lapse in federal appropriations	
13	as a result of the federal shutdown, leaving vulnerable families without necessary assistance;

15	WHEREAS, as a result of the risk to SNAP benefits, the Louisiana Department of	
16	Health has developed a plan to use approximately one hundred and fifty million dollars of	
17	the state's funds previously appropriated to the department to continue SNAP benefits in	
18	November; and	
19	WHEREAS, while Louisiana's action ensures continuity of aid, such expenditures	
20	constitute the use of state funds for a federal obligation and present a significant fiscal risk	
21	to the state; and

WHEREAS, under federal law, the USDA lacks authority to reimburse states for
fronting SNAP benefits during a lapse in appropriations absent express congressional
authorization; and

WHEREAS, Congress has established a clear precedent for such reimbursement, most notably in Public Law 113-46 (Continuing Appropriations Act, 2014), which provides that "[i]f a State (or another Federal grantee) used State funds ... to continue carrying out a Federal program ... the State ... shall be reimbursed for expenses that would have been paid by the Federal Government during such period had appropriations been available"; and

WHEREAS, the House of Representatives of the Legislature of Louisiana finds it fair and necessary that the federal government again adopt such language to protect states acting in good faith to maintain federally funded programs during an appropriation lapse.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the House of Representatives of the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby urge the United States Congress to enact legislation authorizing reimbursement to states that use non-federal funds to continue providing SNAP benefits during a federal government shutdown.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the House of Representatives of the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby recognize that Louisiana's action to protect its citizens during a federal funding lapse should not result in a permanent financial burden on the state and that Congress should act swiftly to guarantee repayment to all participating states.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to the presiding officers of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States of America and to each member of the Louisiana congressional delegation.
