DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. Authorizes the creation of a civil protective order online application portal. (8/1/26)

1 AN ACT

2 To enact R.S. 46:2136.2(H), relative to domestic abuse assistance; to authorize the creation

3 of a statewide portal to allow an online application for a protective order; to provide

4 relative to a petition for a temporary restraining order; and to provide for related

5 matters.

6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

7 Section 1. R.S. 46:2136.2(H) is hereby enacted to read as follows:

8 §2136.2. Louisiana Protective Order Registry; **statewide portal**

9 * * *

10 **H. The judicial administrator's office is authorized to develop and**

11 **implement a statewide portal that allows petitioners to file online a petition for**

12 **any protective order authorized by this Part. Notwithstanding any provisions**

13 **of R.S. 46:2134(D), any petition for a protective order filed through a statewide**

14 **portal shall not require an affirmation.**

Present law provides relative to the La. Protective Order Registry (registry), which is administered by the judicial administrator's office of the La. Supreme Court. Present law provides that the judicial administrator's office is to collect statewide data relative to abuse prevention orders that is transmitted to it from courts, law enforcement, and private process servers of the state and enter it into the registry.

Proposed law authorizes the judicial administrator's office to develop and implement a statewide portal that allows petitioners to file online a petition for any protective order authorized by present law.

Proposed law otherwise retains present law.

Present law requires that a petition requesting the issuance of an ex parte temporary restraining order contain a written affirmation signed and dated by the petitioner that the facts and circumstances contained in the petition are true and correct, under penalty of perjury. Present law further provides that the affirmation be made before a witness, who must sign and print his name.

Proposed law retains present law but provides that a petition for a protective order filed through a statewide portal does not require this affirmation.

Effective August 1, 2026.
