PUBLIC MEETINGS RE INCREASE SG EX See Note Page 1 of 2
 Requires certain public meetings to be broadcast live

Present law requires nonelected boards or commissions that have the authority to levy a tax to video or audio record, film, or broadcast live all proceedings in a public meeting.

Proposed law requires such boards and commissions to video broadcast live all proceedings in a public meeting, and requires each meeting to be video recorded and made available to the public in an online archive located on the website of the board or commission for at least two years. Proposed law additionally requires each state board or commission that is authorized to promulgate rules pursuant to present law (Administrative Procedure Act) and each state board or commission that is authorized to impose a fine or fee to broadcast live all proceedings in a public meeting, and requires each meeting to be recorded and made available to the public in an online archive located on the website of the board or commission, or on a social media platform, for at least two years. Proposed law does not apply to boards or commissions representing districts located entirely within a municipality with a population under 10,000, or within a parish with a population under 25,000.

EXPENDITURE EXPLANATION

There will be increased costs to boards and commissions to broadcast meetings and host recordings online. Costs will vary according to the needs of each entity subject to proposed law and are indeterminable. The LFO assumes the primary means of finance for these expenditures will be self-generated revenues, but other means of finance may be affected to the extent that boards and commissions rely on them.

Proposed law exempts non-elected boards and commissions with the authority to levy a tax from broadcast requirements if they represent a district located entirely within a municipality with a population under 10,000, or within a parish with a population under 25,000. This may exempt some boards and commissions which are currently required to video or audio record, film, or broadcast meeting proceedings under present law, potentially decreasing costs for those boards and commissions, but any such decrease is indeterminable.

Proposed law greatly expands the number of boards and commissions required to broadcast and record meetings. For example, the set of boards and commissions who can charge fees, levy fines, or promulgate rules includes each of over 40 occupational licensing boards, as well as other regulatory boards and commissions such as the Commission of Weights and Measures, the Egg Commission, and the Boll Weevil Eradication Commission.

Boards and commissions meeting in Baton Rouge may potentially comply with proposed law by meeting in spaces that are currently equipped for streaming. These include several rooms in the Claiborne Conference Center with half-day rates ranging from \$100 to \$800, as well as the capitol committee rooms, which state boards and commissions may use without charge. However, given the large number of boards and commissions subject to proposed law, it is unclear that such facilities would be sufficient for all such meetings.

For boards and commissions that choose to equip their current meeting space for streaming, costs associated with broadcasting meetings will vary significantly depending on the equipment and methodology used to broadcast the meeting. The lowest-cost option may be a smartphone or inexpensive webcam broadcasting to a free streaming platform such as YouTube or Facebook Live. This may not carry any cost; however, it may result in such poor audio and video quality that viewers cannot understand what is being discussed.

While researching a similar bill in 2024, LFO corresponded with two school districts regarding the equipment they currently use for broadcasting school board meetings. One school district reported using a \$50,000 audiovisual configuration in its meeting room, including three cameras that cost approximately \$2,500 each. Conversely, another district reported using two Panasonic HC-V180 cameras, which retail for approximately \$250 each, in addition to equipment for video switching and audio mixing which retail for approximately \$1,000. However, sophisticated audio-visual equipment may not be needed for small meetings using a single-camera setup.

The Office of Technology Services (OTS) generally does not provide services for most boards and commissions, but did provide some cost estimates for streaming equipment. OTS estimates that one-time costs for equipment will range from \$2,000 for a single-camera setup to \$15,000 or more for a multi-camera professional streaming installation. Boards and commissions would also need to ensure their meeting location's Internet connection has adequate bandwidth for streaming.

Boards and commissions subject to proposed law will need to comply with a US Department of Justice rule governing accessibility of web content provided by state and local governments. The rule will take effect in April of 2027 for state government entities and local government entities serving a population of 50,000 or more, and it will take effect in April of 2028 for all other local government entities. The rule will require video content to include captions. Boards and commissions will therefore need to ensure that their broadcasting medium provides for captioning. A Zoom Webinar subscription, for example, costs approximately \$800 per year for a maximum of 300 attendees and includes automatic captioning features.

If any non-elected boards or commissions with the authority to levy a tax, including local boards and commissions, currently only record audio of public meetings, they will incur costs to instead record and broadcast video of the meetings. However, if is unclear that any existing boards or commissions only record meeting audio.
