Boyd

Existing law provides relative to bail in domestic abuse battery matters, violations of protective orders, stalking, and any felony offense involving the use or threatened use of force against a family member.

Existing law provides for a contradictory bail hearing and conditions under which bail may be granted.

New law provides that the court may order a person to be held without bail for a "cooling off" period of not less than 48 hours nor more than 72 hours if he is charged with certain domestic abuse offenses listed in existing law (C.Cr.P. Art. 313).

New law requires the court to consider any fact presented that indicates that the defendant poses an increased risk to the victim, the victim's family, or the public when deciding to order that the defendant be held for a cooling off period.

New law provides that the cooling off period begins immediately upon the court's determination of probable cause and runs concurrently with the 72-hour maximum period for appearance before a judge for the purpose of appointing counsel provided in existing law (C.Cr.P. Art. 230.1).

Effective August 1, 2026.
