2	To appropriate funds to defray the expenses of the Louisiana Judiciary, including the						
3	Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, District Courts, Criminal District Court of Orleans						
4	Parish, and other courts; and to provide for related matters.						
5	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:						
6	Section 1.A. The sum of One Hundred Forty-Six Million Three Hundred Fifty-Seven						
7	Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty-Two and No/100 (\$146,357,762.00) Dollars, or so much						
8	thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of the judiciary,						
9	including the Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, the District Courts, the Criminal District						
10	Court of Orleans Parish, and of the other courts.						
11	B. The total amount herein appropriated is hereby allocated to provide as follows:

The Supreme Court has sole authority to provide by rule for appointments of attorneys as temporary or ad hoc judges. It considers applications for writs to review individual cases, and in addition, has criminal and other appellate jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has exclusive original jurisdiction of disciplinary proceedings against lawyers, recommendations of the Judiciary Commission for the discipline of judges, and fact questions affecting its own appellate jurisdiction. It has inherent authority to regulate the legal profession and to promulgate and update the Code of Judicial Conduct. The court also provides judicial training through the Judicial College and works to improve the administration of

In certain cases, the forty general jurisdiction courts have concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace and parish courts. The district cour generally have appellate jurisdiction of criminal cases tried by city, parish, municipe traffic, and mayors' courts, except in certain cases. The district courts also have appellate jurisdiction over justices of the peace in parishes where no parish courts exist. The Civil District Court of Orleans Parish has jurisdiction of all civil cases in the parish. The Criminal Court of Orleans Parish has jurisdiction over all criminal case in the parish. It also has general supervisory jurisdiction over the municipal and traff courts in Orleans Parish. The Family Court of East Baton Rouge Parish has exclusi jurisdiction of many domestic cases in the parish.
