GAMING: Requests a study of the feasibility and practicality of authorizing Internet gaming in La.

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| 2 | To the House Committee on the Administration of Criminal Justice and the Senate |
| 3 | Committee on Judiciary B to meet and to function as a joint committee to study the |
| 4 | feasibility and practicality of authorizing Internet gaming in Louisiana and to report |
| 5 | the findings of the joint committee to the legislature prior to the convening of the |
| 6 | 2014 Regular Session of the Legislature of Louisiana. |
| 7 | WHEREAS, the Louisiana Legislature from 1990 through 1992 authorized |
| 8 | several forms of gaming, including gaming upon riverboats along designated |
| 9 | waterways, gaming at a land-based casino, the operation of video draw poker |
| 10 | devices, and the conducting of a state lottery; and |
| 11 | WHEREAS, in 1997 the Louisiana Legislature authorized slot machine |
| 12 | gaming at eligible live horse racing facilities; and |
| 13 | WHEREAS, during the past twenty-three years, the gaming industry has |
| 14 | contributed \$14.3 billion to the state budget; and |
| 15 | WHEREAS, revenues generated from the gaming industry make up six |
| 16 | percent of state generated revenue for 2013; and |
| 17 | WHEREAS, since its inception, the gaming industry in Louisiana has been |
| 18 | strictly regulated to provide for a controlled gaming industry which is designed to |
| 19 | promote economic development and protect the citizens of the state; and |
| 20 | WHEREAS, in 1997 Louisiana enacted the crime of gambling by computer |
| 21 | and prohibited the conducting of any game, contest, lottery, or contrivance whereby |

| 1 | a person risks the loss of any thing of value in order to realize a profit when |
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| 2 | accessing the Internet and despite the passage of this law, many websites exist where |
| 3 | Louisiana citizens can participate in Internet gaming activities; and |
| 4 | WHEREAS, in the seventeen years since the crime of gambling by computer |
| 5 | was created both technology and the use of the Internet have flourished, resulting in |
| 6 | the ability to conduct gaming activities through the use of a computer or mobile |
| 7 | device; and |
| 8 | WHEREAS, many Internet gaming opportunities occur outside the borders of |
| 9 | the United States with no safeguards regarding the integrity of the games or protection |
| 10 | of those persons who wager on those games; and |
| 11 | WHEREAS, Delaware passed legislation authorizing Internet gaming in June |
| 12 | of 2012, and both Nevada and New Jersey passed similar legislation in February of |
| 13 | this year to legalize Internet gaming; and |
| 14 | WHEREAS, within a nine-month period, three states have legalized Internet |
| 15 | gaming; and |
| 16 | WHEREAS, Louisiana has the potential to benefit economically by legalizing |
| 17 | Internet gaming; and |
| 18 | WHEREAS, by establishing a regulatory framework to authorize Internet |
| 19 | gaming in Louisiana, the integrity of the games could be ensured and potential |
| 20 | additional revenue sources could be realized. |
| 21 | THEREFORE, the Legislature of Louisiana requests the House Committee on |
| 22 | the Administration of Criminal Justice and the Senate Committee on Judiciary B to |
| 23 | meet and to function as a joint committee to study the feasibility and practicality of |
| 24 | authorizing Internet gaming in Louisiana and to report the findings of the joint |
| 25 | committee to the legislature prior to the convening of the 2014 Regular Session of the |
| 26 | Legislature of Louisiana. |
| 27 | BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the joint committee shall seek input from |
| 28 | the office of the governor, the Louisiana Gaming Control Board, the office of state |
| 29 | police gaming division, the gaming division of the office of the attorney general, the |
| 30 | gaming industry, and any other parties deemed appropriate by the committee. |
