SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 28

BY SENATORS CLAITOR, MURRAY AND GARY SMITH AND REPRESENTATIVES CONNICK, FOIL, GAROFALO, JOHNSON AND LOPINTO

COMMENDATIONS. Commends Loyola University New Orleans College of Law upon its one hundredth anniversary celebration and to declare Tuesday, March 25, 2014, as Loyola Law Day at the State Capitol.

1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION
2	To commend and congratulate the College of Law at Loyola University New Orleans upon
3	its one hundredth anniversary and to declare Tuesday, March 25, 2014, as Loyola
4	Law Day at the State Capitol.
5	WHEREAS, in 1849, the priests of the Jesuit order, known as the Society of Jesus,
6	established the College of the Immaculate Conception that would later become Loyola
7	University; moved to its present location in 1884, the institution prospered in the uptown
8	section of the city to reflect its status as an urban center of learning fully integrated into its
9	metropolitan setting; and
10	WHEREAS, the College of Law was founded as the School of Law by Jesuit Father
11	Albert Biever; its first session began on October 5, 1914; its first dean, John St. Paul, was
12	a civil district court judge; and
13	WHEREAS, in its humble beginnings, Dean St. Paul and other members of the bar
14	donated their time to teach evening classes to part-time students; the full-time program was
15	added in 1925; and
16	WHEREAS, the College of Law at Loyola upholds the Jesuit traditions of academic
17	rigor, the pursuit of justice, and service to others in its fundamental mission to educate future
18	members of the Bar to be skilled advocates and sensitive counselors-at-law; and

1	WHEREAS, since its inception; Loyola Law has remained at the forefront of
2	furthering the tenets of ethics in legal education, civil rights, and public interest law; and
3	WHEREAS, in the 1950s, Loyola Law graduates played a crucial role in the orders
4	rendered to desegregate LSU and New Orleans public schools; helping to make integration
5	and equal rights enforcement the law of the land; and
6	WHEREAS, Loyola Law has also demonstrated equity of gender; Alice Allen was
7	its first female law student in 1921; and
8	WHEREAS, Loyola Law continues the advancement of the Jesuits' ideal of social
9	justice by encouraging concentrated study in several specialized legal disciplines through
10	the Center for Environmental Law and Land Use, the Center for International and
11	Comparative Programs, Continuing Legal Education, the Gillis Long Poverty Law Center,
12	and the Stuart H. Smith Law Clinic and the Center for Social Justice; and
13	WHEREAS, the Gillis Long Poverty Law Center is the oldest law clinic in Louisiana
14	and the largest in the South, serving over seven hundred clients annually; and
15	WHEREAS, Loyola Law is critically acclaimed for its academic scholarship and
16	success in national and international moot court competitions; and
17	WHEREAS, Loyola Law continues to play a pivotal role in controversial social
18	issues that include capital punishment, immigration reform, the disenfranchisement of the
19	homeless, and labor relations.
20	THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby
21	commend and congratulate the College of Law at Loyola University New Orleans upon its
22	one hundredth anniversary and does hereby note its many contributions to advancement of
23	legal expertise and social reform in the justice system.
24	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Legislature of Louisiana does hereby declare
25	March 25, 2014, as Loyola Law Day at the State Capitol.
26	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to María
27	Pabón López, dean of Loyola University New Orleans College of Law.
