HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 66

SPECIAL DAY/WEEK/MONTH: Recognizes Tuesday, April 8, 2014, as Equal Pay Day in Louisiana

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2	To recognize Tuesday, April 8, 2014, as Equal Pay Day in the state of Louisiana.
3	WHEREAS, for more than fifty years after the passage of the Equal Pay Act, women,
4	especially minority women, continue to suffer the consequences of unequal pay; and
5	WHEREAS, House Concurrent Resolution No. 145 of the 2013 Regular Session of
6	the Legislature, by Representative Leger, established the Louisiana Fair Pay Task Force to
7	study wage disparities between men and women, and to make recommendations for policy
8	changes and legislation to prevent and eliminate the disparities of unequal pay; and
9	WHEREAS, the findings of the Louisiana Fair Pay Task Force were published and
10	submitted to the Legislature of Louisiana on March 1, 2014; some of the findings are
11	included within this Resolution; and
12	WHEREAS, according to the United States Census Bureau, full-time working
13	women who worked year-round in the year 2011 earned an average of 77% of the earnings
14	of their male counterparts, which indicates minimal progress in pay equity; and
15	WHEREAS, nationally, women's median annual earnings were \$37,133; the highest
16	paid women workers were in the District of Columbia with annual earnings of \$60,332,
17	while the lowest paid women were in the state of Mississippi with annual earnings of
18	\$29,548; and
19	WHEREAS, in the state of Louisiana, women represent a steady number of the work
20	force comprising of 44.3% of the full-time, year-round Louisiana labor force; and

1	WHEREAS, in 2012, Louisiana women who worked full-time, year-round earned
2	just 66.9 cents for every dollar earned by a Louisiana man, resulting in a gender wage gap
3	of 33%, which was a 2% greater gap than in 2011; and
4	WHEREAS, in Louisiana, women working full-time, year-round in 2012 earned an
5	average \$31,586, which is a decrease of \$276 from the 2011 earning average of \$31,862; and
6	WHEREAS, the decrease in Louisiana women's earnings dropped Louisiana's
7	ranking from forty-third to forty-sixth lowest among the fifty states and the District of
8	Columbia; and
9	WHEREAS, in contrast, Louisiana men working full-time, year-round earned on
10	average \$47,249, which is an increase of \$936 from 2011, ranking Louisiana men twenty-
11	second with average earnings greater than the earnings of men in twenty-nine other states;
12	and
13	WHEREAS, nearly four in ten mothers are primary income producers in their
14	households, and nearly two-thirds are significant earners, which makes pay equity critical
15	to families' economic security; and
16	WHEREAS, in Louisiana, poverty is most prevalent among female-headed families
17	with children under eighteen years of age at an estimated 49%; and
18	WHEREAS, poverty rates were highest in Louisiana for black women and girls at
19	36.1%, Hispanic females at 27%, Asian females at 25.6%, and white females at 14.3%; and
20	WHEREAS, in Louisiana, educational attainment is greater for women than for men
21	who are twenty-five years of age or older; and
22	WHEREAS, according to one study, 84.7% of Louisiana women have a high school
23	education or higher education, compared to men at 81.2%; 15% of women have attained a
24	bachelor's degree, compared to men at 13.7%; and 7.8% of women have a graduate or
25	professional degree, compared to men at 7.3%; and
26	WHEREAS, in Louisiana, women and men are not paid equitably for their
27	educational attainment; and
28	WHEREAS, according to an estimate, college-educated women who work full-time
29	earn more than a half-million dollars less than their male peers earn over the course of a
30	lifetime; and

1	WHEREAS, a lifetime of lower pay means women have less income to save for
2	retirement and less income that is calculated in a Social Security or pension benefit formula;
3	and
4	WHEREAS, the members of the Louisiana Legislative Women's Caucus who support
5	equal pay join with the American Association of University of Women and other women's
6	organizations across the state of Louisiana and the United States to share information
7	regarding equal pay; and
8	WHEREAS, fair pay equity policies can be implemented simply without undue costs
9	or hardships in both public and private sectors; and
10	WHEREAS, fair pay strengthens the security of families and eases future retirement
11	costs, while enhancing the American economy; and
12	WHEREAS, Tuesday, April 8, 2014, symbolizes the time in 2014 when the wages
13	paid to American women catch-up to the wages paid to men from the previous year.
14	THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby
15	proclaim Tuesday, April 8, 2014, as Equal Pay Day in Louisiana and urges the citizens of
16	Louisiana to recognize the full value of women's skills and significant contributions to the
17	labor force, and further encourages businesses to conduct an internal pay evaluation to
18	ensure women are being paid fairly.
19	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a suitable copy of this Resolution be transmitted
20	to the Louisiana Legislative Women's Caucus.
