CONDOLENCES: Expresses condolences upon the death of Judge Manuel "Manny" Adam Fernandez, former state representative

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2	To express condolences upon the death of Judge Manuel "Manny" Adam Fernandez and to
3	express enduring gratitude for his outstanding contributions to the state of Louisiana,
4	particularly during his tenure as a distinguished member of the Louisiana House of
5	Representatives.
6	WHEREAS, Manuel "Manny" Adam Fernandez was born in St. Bernard Parish on
7	October 15, 1942, to Manuel William Fernandez and Blanche Perez Fernandez Molero; and
8	WHEREAS, Judge Fernandez attended St. Bernard Parish public schools graduating
9	from St. Bernard High School in 1960 and then attended the University of Southwestern
10	Louisiana (USL) in Lafayette where he earned an undergraduate degree in economics; and
11	WHEREAS, upon graduation from USL, which is now known as the University of
12	Louisiana, at Lafayette, in 1964, Judge Fernandez enrolled in the Loyola University Law
13	School in New Orleans from whence he earned his Juris Doctorate in 1967; and
14	WHEREAS, as a practicing attorney for thirty-four years, Judge Fernandez was
15	president and a member of the St. Bernard Bar Association, the Louisiana Bar Association,
16	and had been admitted to practice law before the United States Supreme Court, the United
17	States Court of Claims, and all federal and state courts in the state of Louisiana; and
18	WHEREAS, Judge Fernandez devoted decades to serving the citizens of the state of
19	Louisiana, beginning his public service as the representative of District 104 in the Louisiana
20	House of Representatives where he served from 1972 through 1987, serving as a member

2	relations, and natural resources for which he served as chair; and
3	WHEREAS, Mr. Fernandez said that as a legislator he was most proud of helping to
4	rewrite the community property laws so that wives had equal management rights of
5	community property; he also helped develop the current joint custody rights of children; and
6	as chairman of the House Committee on Natural Resources, he was the author of legislation
7	creating the Department of Environmental Quality; and
8	WHEREAS, upon his departure from the legislature, Mr. Fernandez was appointed
9	by Governor Buddy Roemer to serve on his "kitchen cabinet", a three-person super cabinet
10	that would serve as liaison between the governor's office, the departmental secretaries, and
11	the legislature and would enable the departmental secretaries to focus on running their
12	departments rather than becoming embroiled in the political lobbying on behalf of the
13	administration, with Mr. Fernandez serving in this capacity for two years and being
14	responsible for the departments of Social Services, Health and Hospitals, Wildlife and
15	Fisheries, Natural Resources, and Environmental Quality; and
16	WHEREAS, in May 2001, Mr. Fernandez was elected judge to fill a partial term on
17	the Thirty-Fourth Judicial District Court, Division B to which he was re-elected and where
18	he served until his retirement in the summer of 2013; and
19	WHEREAS, while serving on the Thirty-Fourth Judicial District bench, Judge
20	Fernandez was a guest lecturer and presenter on many legal subjects, served as the Louisiana
21	editor on environmental texts, co-authored an article on the rights of the terminally ill that
22	was published in medical journals, and he served as chief judge and was the founder of the
23	drug court in the Thirty-Fourth Judicial District Court; and
24	WHEREAS, Judge Fernandez was stepson of the late Scott Molero; the husband of
25	Dorothy Harrington Fernandez; the father of Gina Fernandez, Jill Willie, and Amy
26	Ybarzabal and stepfather of Casey Hutchens; and grandfather (Pop Pop) to Nick, Eric,
27	Daniel, Ben, and Madeline Priola; Foster, Simon, and Samuel Willie; Adam, Gabrielle,
28	Kyle, and Camille Ybarzabel; and Emily Hutchens; and
29	WHEREAS, Judge Fernandez was proudly recognized as "Man of the Year" and
30	"Legislator of the Year" in St. Bernard Parish; and

1 WHEREAS, Judge Fernandez will be forever remembered as a loving and loyal 2 husband, father, grandfather, and a friend to many, who loved his community and treasured 3 his family; and 4 WHEREAS, the death of Judge Fernandez has left a great void and created a genuine sense of sorrow in all who knew him, including the members of the legislative family, all 5 6 of whom mourn the loss of this wonderful man who served his state and this institution with 7 distinction, integrity, and statesmanship. 8 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby 9 express sincere and heartfelt condolences upon the death of former state representative Judge 10 Manuel "Manny" Fernandez and does hereby record for posterity the enduring appreciation 11 of the citizens of Louisiana for his outstanding contributions and achievements, particularly 12 during his tenure as a distinguished member of the Louisiana House of Representatives. 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a suitable copy of this Resolution be transmitted 14 to the family of Judge Fernandez.
