COMMENDATIONS: Commends the Los Isleños of St. Bernard Parish for their contributions to the culture and history of Louisiana

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

| 4 | WHEREAS, the Canary Islands were explored and colonized by Jean de Bethancort |
| 5 | under the instructions of King Henry of Castille beginning in 1399 and ending with the |
| 6 | conquest of Tenerife in 1496 thereby becoming the first colony of the Spanish Empire; and |
| 7 | WHEREAS, the Canarian chain consists of thirteen islands of which seven are |
| 8 | inhabited: Fuerteventura, Lanzarote, Gran Canana, Hierro, Tenerife, LaPalma, and Gomera; |
| 9 | and |
| 10 | WHEREAS, after France ceded Louisiana to Spain and Great Britain in 1766 |
| 11 | following the French and Indian War, Spain acquired that portion of Louisiana west of the |
| 12 | Mississippi River and the Isle of Orleans located east of the Mississippi including the city |
| 13 | of New Orleans; and |
| 14 | WHEREAS, in the early 1770s, the British began planning their route through |
| 15 | Louisiana to Mexico to capture the vast deposits of Mexican silver and gold which caused |
| 16 | the Spanish to develop Louisiana as a barrier between Mexico and the British colonies east |
| 17 | of the Mississippi River along the Gulf Coast; and |
| 18 | WHEREAS, the Spanish sent colonists, known as Isleños because they had come |
| 19 | from the Canary Islands, from all seven of the inhabited Canary Islands to Louisiana |
| 20 | between 1778 and 1783 in an effort by the Spanish government to populate Louisiana and |
| 21 | halt the British colonial expansion west of the Mississippi River, with those first Isleños |

1 settling in four locations strategically placed to defend New Orleans - Galveztown, just 2 south of Baton Rouge; Valenzuela, along Bayou Lafourche; Barataria, along Bayou des 3 Families in Jefferson Parish; and La Concepcion, later San Bernardo, in St. Bernard Parish 4 along Bayou Terre-aux-Boeufs; and 5 WHEREAS, two hundred years ago, the Isleños fought under the command of 6 Governor Bernardo de Galvez in the American Revolution and successfully thwarted the 7 British invasion of Louisiana during the Battle of New Orleans in 1814; and 8 WHEREAS, of the four Isleños settlements, San Bernardo, established in 1779 along 9 Bayou Terre-aux-Boeufs, was the most successful with the farmers there providing most of 10 the garlic, onions, beans, potatoes, and poultry consumed by the residents of nearby New 11 Orleans; and 12 WHEREAS, Isleños social life was centered around family and the Roman Catholic 13 Church with sometimes four generations of family living and working together on the farms 14 along Bayou Terre-aux-Boeufs; and 15 WHEREAS, Manuel Solis and Antonio Mendez, two officials in the Spanish 16 administration of Colonial Louisiana, perfected the process of granulating sugar at their 17 Woodlake Plantation in 1787, a process that enabled sugar to quickly become a profitable 18 cash crop that would replace indigo as the major cash crop in Louisiana; and 19 WHEREAS, not only did the Isleños of St. Bernard Parish influence Louisiana's 20 ability to produce plentiful sugar and her reputation as a sugar-producing region, they were 21 well-known for their fishing communities with the residents of Delacroix, Shell Beach, and 22 Ycloskey harvesting the seafood that supplied the New Orleans restaurants and began the 23 Louisiana reputation for fine Gulf seafood and fine dining in the city of New Orleans; and 24 WHEREAS, the marshes of St. Bernard Parish were nationally recognized for the 25 abundance of mink, muskrat, and other fur-bearing animals which produced highly prized 26 pelts in the years prior to World War II producing a multimillion dollar industry; and 27 WHEREAS, the history of the Isleños and of St. Bernard Parish are inextricably 28 intertwined with the history and renown of the entire state of Louisiana and they have both 29 played a vital role in making Louisiana the state she is today.
