Provides relative to professional organizations that certify persons to perform chemical analysis of a person's blood, urine, breath, or other bodily substances

<u>Present law</u> provides for chemical analyses of a person's blood, urine, breath, or other bodily substance to be used as evidence of intoxication. <u>Present law</u> provides that persons performing such chemical analyses shall have a valid permit issued by the DPS&C and use methods approved by the department. <u>Present law</u> authorizes DPS&C to use an individual's or a lab's certification by one or more of the following professional organizations in its determination of the qualifications and competence of the individuals and labs to whom the permits are issued: 1) College of American Pathologists, 2) American Board of Forensic Toxicology, 3) Forensic Quality Services & 4) American Society of Crime Lab Directors. <u>Proposed law</u> adds the American Association for Laboratory Accreditation (A2LA) and changes the name of the American Society of Crime Lab Directors to the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB).

Proposed Senate committee amendment increases operating record fee from \$6 to \$16.

EXPENDITURE EXPLANATION

There is no anticipated direct material effect on governmental expenditures as a result of this measure.

REVENUE EXPLANATION

The proposed Senate committee amendment will result in an increase in self-generated revenue as a result of increasing the official driving record fee from \$6 to \$16. Based on a three year historical average, the Office of Motor Vehicles (OMV) collects approximately \$13,080,000 from 2,180,000 requests. To the extent the average number of requests remain static, OMV will generate \$34,880,000 (2,180,000 requests x \$16 fee), an increase of \$21,800,000 annually. However, a materially higher fee may deter requests, and this simple extrapolation constitutes a maximum potential revenue gain from this fee increase.
