

1 podiatrists; polysomnographic health professionals; professional counselors; psychologists;
2 radiologic technologists; rehabilitation counselors; respiratory therapists; social workers; and
3 speech-language pathologists; and

4 WHEREAS, through its function as a lawmaking body, the legislature plays an
5 essential role in setting policy for all professions and occupations; however, this
6 policymaking role occurs within an inherently political context; and

7 WHEREAS, in taking up any prospective expansion, limitation, or other revision to
8 a health profession's scope of practice, the legislature must evaluate numerous
9 considerations, the most significant of which is the delicate balance between expanding
10 access to care and ensuring patient safety; and

11 WHEREAS, in the legislature, the initial duty of screening health profession scope
12 of practice proposals lies with the committees on health and welfare, which must consider
13 significant amounts of information and extensive public comments given by individuals,
14 officials, and interest groups which come before the committees to support or oppose various
15 scope of practice measures; and

16 WHEREAS, objective, reliable information is essential for any policymaking body
17 to make decisions that best serve the public interest; and

18 WHEREAS, other states seek, obtain, and process information concerning health
19 profession scope of practice proposals through special review committees; and

20 WHEREAS, notable among state scope of practice review programs is that of
21 Connecticut, which in 2009 employed the Legislative Program Review and Investigations
22 Committee, a bipartisan, statutory committee of the state's legislature, to evaluate scope of
23 practice review models of fourteen other states and make recommendations to the
24 Connecticut General Assembly, which later enacted Public Act No. 11-209 in 2011 creating
25 a scope of practice determinations program within the state's health agency that is now
26 viewed as one of the most effective programs of its type in the nation; and

27 WHEREAS, the necessity of a program or committee of this type in Louisiana has
28 been demonstrated through the legislature's experience of recent sessions of considering
29 high-profile and highly controversial scope of practice proposals affecting several health
30 professions; and

1 WHEREAS, it is clear that establishing some form of independent, nonpolitical
2 scope of practice review committee would greatly enhance the ability of legislators to make
3 the most informed and most prudent policy decisions when faced with matters so vital to the
4 well-being of Louisiana's citizens as proposals affecting the scope of practice of our state's
5 health professions.

6 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby
7 create a special study group to evaluate and make recommendations concerning the
8 prospective establishment of an independent health professions scope of practice review
9 committee to be known as the "Louisiana Health Professions Institute".

10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study committee shall be composed of the
11 following members:

12 (1) The secretary of the Department of Health and Hospitals or his designee.

13 (2) The chancellor of the Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center at New
14 Orleans or his designee.

15 (3) The chancellor of the Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center at
16 Shreveport or his designee.

17 (4) The dean of the Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical
18 Medicine or his designee.

19 (5) The dean of the Southern University School of Nursing or his designee.

20 (6) The chief executive officer of the Louisiana Public Health Institute or his
21 designee.

22 (7) The director of the Louisiana State Law Institute or his designee.

23 (8) The president of the Public Affairs Research Council of Louisiana or his
24 designee.

25 (9) The president and chief executive officer of the Council for A Better Louisiana
26 or his designee.

27 (10) The chief executive officer of the Louisiana Association of Health Plans or his
28 designee.

29 (11) The executive director of the Louisiana Workforce Commission or his designee.

1 (12) A member of the Louisiana House of Representatives appointed by the speaker
2 of the House of Representatives.

3 (13) A member of the Louisiana Senate appointed by the president of the Senate.

4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the secretary of the Department of Health and
5 Hospitals shall take such actions as are necessary to ensure that the study group convenes
6 on or before September 30, 2016.

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that at its initial meeting, the study group shall elect
8 a chairperson and shall adopt rules of procedure and any other policies it deems necessary
9 to facilitate its work.

10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study group shall meet on dates and at times
11 and places designated by the chairperson.

12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the study group shall serve
13 without compensation, except per diem or expense reimbursement to which they may be
14 individually entitled by their respective employers.

15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in conducting the evaluation required by this
16 Resolution, the study group shall consider as a model for the Louisiana Health Professions
17 Institute the scope of practice review system of the state of Connecticut, any such system of
18 another state addressed in the report of the Connecticut Legislative Program Review and
19 Investigations Committee entitled "Scope of Practice Determination for Health Care
20 Professions", the model which was proposed in Senate Bill No. 649 of the 2014 Regular
21 Session of the Legislature, and any other model as may be selected by members of the
22 committee.

23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study group shall submit a written report of
24 findings and recommendations concerning the prospective establishment of the Louisiana
25 Health Professions Institute to the House Committee on Health and Welfare, the Senate
26 Committee on Health and Welfare, the House and Governmental Affairs Committee, and the
27 Senate and Governmental Affairs Committee no later than thirty days prior to the convening
28 of the 2017 Regular Session of the Legislature.

29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to the
30 secretary of the Department of Health and Hospitals, the chancellor of the Louisiana State

1 University Health Sciences Center at New Orleans, the chancellor of the Louisiana State
2 University Health Sciences Center at Shreveport, the dean of the Tulane University School
3 of Public Health and Tropical Medicine, the dean of the Southern University School of
4 Nursing, the chief executive officer of the Louisiana Public Health Institute, the director of
5 the Louisiana State Law Institute, the president of the Public Affairs Research Council of
6 Louisiana, the president and chief executive officer of the Council for A Better Louisiana,
7 the chief executive officer of the Louisiana Association of Health Plans, and the executive
8 director of the Louisiana Workforce Commission.

Requires the study group to report findings and recommendations concerning the prospective establishment of the La. Health Professions Institute to the legislative committees on health and welfare and the legislative committees on governmental affairs no later than 30 days prior to the convening of the 2017 RS.
