APPROPRIATIONS: Appropriates funds for the expenses of the judiciary for Fiscal Year 2016-2017

1 AN ACT 2 To appropriate funds to defray the expenses of the Louisiana Judiciary, including the 3 Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, District Courts, Criminal District Court of Orleans 4 Parish, and other courts; and to provide for related matters. 5 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: 6 Section 1.A. The sum of One Hundred Eighty-Six Million Seven Hundred Thirteen 7 Thousand Five Hundred Ninety Two No/100 (\$186,713,592.00) Dollars, or so much thereof 8 as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of the judiciary, 9 including the Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, the District Courts, the Criminal District Court of Orleans Parish, and of the other courts. 10 11 B. Program Description: The Supreme Court has general supervisory jurisdiction over all lower courts. It may establish procedural and administrative rules not in conflict with law and may assign a sitting or retired judge to any court. The Supreme Court has sole authority to provide by rule for appointments of attorneys as temporary or ad hoc judges. It considers applications for writs to review individual cases, and has criminal and other appellate jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has exclusive original jurisdiction of disciplinary proceedings against lawyers, recommendations of the Judiciary Commission of Louisiana for the discipline of judges, and fact questions affecting its appellate jurisdiction. It has inherent authority to regulate the legal profession and to promulgate and update the Code of Judicial Conduct. The court also provides judicial training through the Judicial College and works to improve the administration of justice.

Abstract: Appropriates funds for FY 2016-2017 for expenses of the La. Judiciary, including the supreme court, courts of appeal, district courts, Criminal Court of Orleans Parish, juvenile and family courts, and other courts.

Appropriates funds for FY 2016-2017 for the ordinary operating expenses of the judicial branch of government with total funding of \$163,655,352 from the following sources: \$143,855,017 out of the State General Fund (Direct); \$9,392,850 through interagency transfers from the Dept. of Children and Family Services; and, \$10,407,485 from statutory dedications out of the Judges' Supplemental Compensation Fund and the Trial Court Case Management Fund.

Funding for the ordinary operating expenses of the judicial branch of government is provided as follows:

Summary of Amendments Adopted by House

The Committee Amendments Proposed by <u>House Committee on Appropriations</u> to the original bill:

1. Provide for a change in means of financing to decrease State General Fund (Direct) and increase Interagency Transfers from the Dept. of Children and Family Services by \$9,392,850 for drug court maintenance and enhancement and Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA).

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CODING: Words in struck through type are deletions from existing law; words <u>underscored</u> are additions.

2. Add requirement that appropriations contained in this Act be reduced by a total amount of \$23,058,240 pursuant to a plan adopted by the Judicial Budgetary Control Board or as approved by the La. Supreme Court.
