<u>Bill Header:</u> RETIREMENT/FIREFIGHTERS: Provides relative to earnable compensation in the Firefighters' Retirement System.

Cost Summary:

The estimated actuarial and fiscal impact of HB 9 on the retirement systems and their plan sponsors is summarized below. Actuarial costs pertain to estimated changes in the *actuarial present value of future benefit payments*. Fiscal costs or savings pertain to changes to all cash flows over the next five year period including retirement system cash flows, OPEB cash flows, or cash flows related to other government entities.

An increase in actuarial costs is denoted throughout the actuarial note by "Increase" or a positive number. Actuarial savings are denoted by "Decrease" or a negative number. An increase in expenditures or revenues (fiscal impact) is denoted by "Increase" or a positive number. A decrease in expenditures or revenues is denoted by "decrease" or a negative number.

Estimated Actuarial Impact:

The top part of the following chart shows the estimated change in the actuarial present value of future benefit payments and expenses, if any, attributable to the proposed legislation. The bottom part shows the effect on cash flows.

Bill Information

Current Law

Under current law, "earnable compensation" is defined as the full amount of compensation earned by an employee on a regular tour of duty, including supplemental pay paid by the state of Louisiana, but shall not include overtime.

Proposed Law

HB 9 retains the current law but adds to the following pay to the definition of "earnable compensation".

- 1. Educational incentive pay,
- 2. Holiday pay,
- 3. Seniority incentive pay,
- 4. And pay to an employee acting in a civil service classification higher than one holds.

Implications of the Proposed Changes

The Louisiana Supreme Court recently ruled in Dunn vs. the City of Kenner that "earnable compensation" should include the amounts identified above. HB 9 merely codifies into law the recent ruling by the Supreme Court.

I. ACTUARIAL ANALYSIS SECTION

A. Analysis of Actuarial Costs

(Prepared by LLA)

This section of the actuarial note pertains to the actuarial present value cost or savings associated with the retirement systems, with OPEB, and with other government entities.

1. Retirement Systems

The actuarial present value cost of HB 9 associated with the retirement systems is estimated to be \$0. Our analysis is summarized below.

There are no actuarial present value costs or savings associated with HB 9 because the bill merely codifies the "earnable compensation" ruling made by the Louisiana Supreme Court. No individual will receive either a larger benefit or a smaller benefit than what he would receive if HB 9 is not enacted.

2. Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB)

The actuarial present value cost of HB 9 associated with OPEB, including retiree health insurance premiums, is estimated to be \$0. Our analysis is summarized below.

There are no actuarial present value costs or savings associated with HB 9. HB 9 changes the system's definition of "earnable compensation" and has no effect on the amount of OPEB benefits available to the FRS member.

3. Other Government Entities

The actuarial cost of HB 9 associated with government entities other than those identified in HB 9, is estimated to be \$0. Our analysis is summarized below.

Actuarial present value costs associated with other government entities may be derived from two sources:

- 1. Costs or savings indirectly attributable to other government entities, and
- 2. Administrative costs or savings associated with FRS and its sponsors.

There are no costs or savings attributable to other government agencies or to FRS or its sponsors because HB 9 does not change any benefit or administrative practice. The court's decision produced no relevant costs or savings, if any; the enactment of HB 9 will enact into law the decision already made by the court.

B. Actuarial Data, Methods and Assumptions

(Prepared by LLA)

Unless indicated otherwise, the actuarial note for HB 9 was prepared using actuarial data, methods and assumptions as disclosed in the most recent actuarial valuation reports adopted by PRSAC. The data, methods and assumptions are being used to provide consistency with the actuary for the retirement system who may also be providing testimony to the Senate and House retirement committees.

C. Actuarial Caveat

(Prepared by LLA)

There is nothing in HB 9 that will compromise the signing actuary's ability to present an unbiased statement of actuarial opinion.

II. FISCAL ANALYSIS SECTION

This section of the actuarial note pertains to fiscal costs or savings associated with the retirement systems (Table A), with OPEB (Table B), and with other fiscal costs or savings attributable to government entities not associated with either the retirement systems or OPEB (Table C). Fiscal costs or savings reflect all forms of cash flow including benefit costs or savings, administrative costs or savings, or any other identifiable type of fiscal cost or savings. The total effect of HB 9 on fiscal costs, fiscal savings, or cash flows is presented in Table D.

A. Estimated Fiscal Impact – Retirement Systems (Prepared by LLA)

1. Narrative

Table A shows the estimated fiscal impact of the proposed legislation on the retirement systems and the government entities that sponsor them. A fiscal cost is denoted by "Increase" or a positive number. Fiscal savings are denoted by "Decrease" or a negative number. A revenue increase is denoted by "Increase" or a positive number. A revenue decrease is denoted by "Decrease" or a negative number.

Table A shows the estimated fiscal impact of the proposed legislation on the retirement systems and the government entities that sponsor them. The impact on fiscal information in Table A includes administrative costs or savings associated with the retirement system and the sponsoring government entities.

For reasons cited above under the *actuarial analysis section*, HB 9 will have no fiscal impact on the retirement systems, on OPEB, or on other government entities.

For reasons cited above under the *actuarial analysis section*, HB 9 will have no fiscal impact on OPEB or its sponsors.

HB 9 will have the following effects on fiscal costs and revenues related to other government entities during the five year measurement period.

2. Expenditures:

There is no anticipated indirect material effect on the expenditures of local governmental entities (e.g., fire district) as a result of this measure. This bill clarifies the definition of "earnable compensation" as it relates to the Firefighters' Retirement System to make the definition reflect the ruling from a recent La. Supreme Court case on earnable compensation (Dunn v. City of Kenner). Based on information from the Firefighters' Retirement System, Louisiana State Firemen's Association, Louisiana Municipal Association, and St. George Fire Department, it appears that this bill will not impact the expenditures of other governmental entities.

3. Revenues:

There is no anticipated indirect material effect on the revenues of local governmental entities (e.g., fire district) as a result of this measure. This bill clarifies the definition of "earnable compensation" as it relates to the Firefighters' Retirement System to make the definition reflect the ruling from a recent court case on earnable compensation (Dunn v. City of Kenner). Based on information from the Firefighters' Retirement System, Louisiana State Firemen's Association, Louisiana Municipal Association, and St. George Fire Department, it appears that this bill will not impact the revenues of other governmental entities.

D. <u>Estimated Fiscal Impact: All Retirement Systems, OPEB, and All Government Entities</u> (Prepared by LLA)

1. Narrative

Table D shows the estimated fiscal impact of HB 9 on all government entities within the state of Louisiana. Cell values in Table D are the sum of the respective cell values in Table A, Table B, and Table C. A fiscal cost is denoted by "Increase" or a positive number.
