STUDENTS: Provides relative to early graduation from high school including incentives for students and savings used for certain other educational purposes

1	AN ACT
2	To amend and reenact R.S. 17:22(11) and 2925(A)(2) and to enact R.S. 17:22(12), 407.30,
3	and 1609, relative to students; to require students' Individual Graduation Plans to
4	include plans on how to graduate from high school by the end of grade eleven; to
5	provide funding for other educational purposes using the savings to the state
6	resulting from such early graduation; to require the state superintendent of education
7	to report certain information relative to such early graduation and related savings;
8	to provide for scholarships for such students and to provide for administration and
9	funding for such scholarships; to provide for funding for the Child Care Assistance
10	Program; and to provide for related matters.
11	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
12	Section 1. R.S. 17:22(11) and 2925(A)(2) are hereby amended and reenacted and
13	R.S. 17:22(12), 407.30, and 1609 are hereby enacted to read as follows:
14	§22. Superintendent; functions and duties
15	The superintendent shall:

17	(11) Submit a report by March fifteenth each year to the governor, the
18	commissioner of administration, and the legislature that contains all of the following
19	information:

1	(a) The number of students who graduated or are expected to graduate from
2	high school in fewer than four years and the amount of state funding in the minimum
3	foundation program formula that would have otherwise been appropriated to fund
4	their education if they had not graduated early.
5	(b) The estimated value and total cost of scholarships that such students are
6	eligible to receive pursuant to R.S. 17:1609.
7	(c) The estimated number of children who could be served through the Child
8	Care Assistance Program if the legislature appropriates funds for the program as
9	provided in R.S. 17:407.30.
10	(12) Perform such other functions as provided by law.

12	§407.30. Child Care Assistance Program; funding
13	A.(1) The legislature finds that savings to the state can be achieved as a
14	result of students graduating from high school in fewer than four years since such
15	students would no longer be counted in the minimum foundation program formula
16	and that such savings should be used for other educational purposes.
17	(2) The legislature further finds that one such purpose should be to provide
18	for more funding for the Child Care Assistance Program.
19	B. The state Department of Education shall receive from the state an amount
20	equal to forty-nine percent of the state Level I base per pupil amount contained in the
21	minimum foundation program formula for each student who gradutes from a public
22	high school in three years, and the department shall use such funds in administering
23	the Child Care Assistance Program pursuant to rules promulgated by the State Board
24	of Elementary and Secondary Education in accordance with the Administrative
25	Procedure Act.
26	C. The provisions of this Section shall be subject to the appropriation of
27	funds by the legislature for such purpose.

1	§1609. Early College Scholarship
2	A.(1) The legislature finds that savings to the state can be achieved as a
3	result of students graduating from high school in fewer than four years since such
4	students would no longer be counted in the minimum foundation program formula
5	and that such savings should be used for other educational purposes.
6	(2) The legislature further finds that one such purpose should be to provide
7	high school students with an incentive to graduate early by providing scholarships
8	to those students to attend a public postsecondary education institution in this state
9	or any regionally accredited independent college or university in the state that is a
10	member of the Louisiana Association of Independent Colleges and Universities.
11	B. The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance, pursuant to rules
12	adopted by the Board of Regents in accordance with the Administrative Procedure
13	Act, shall award an "Early College Scholarship" to a student who completes all high
14	school graduation requirements and receives a high school diploma by the end of
15	grade eleven and enrolls in a Louisiana public postsecondary education institution
16	or any regionally accredited independent college or university in the state that is a
17	member of the Louisiana Association of Independent Colleges and Universities
18	within one year of graduating. The value of the scholarship shall be equal to forty-
19	nine percent of the state Level I base per pupil amount contained in the minimum
20	foundation program formula, excluding any weights. Scholarship payments shall be
21	made to the institution upon evidence of the student's enrollment. The scholarship
22	shall be a one-time scholarship and shall not be renewed.
23	C. The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance shall receive an
24	amount equal to two percent of the state Level I base per pupil amount contained in
25	the minimum foundation program formula for each such student to defray the costs
26	of administering the scholarship program.
27	D. Implementation of this Section shall be subject to the appropriation of
28	funds by the legislature for such purpose.

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1	§2925. Individual graduation plans

4	(2)(a) By the end of the eighth grade, each student's Individual Graduation
5	Plan, or the student's Individualized Education Plan, if applicable, shall list the
6	required core courses to be taken through the tenth grade and shall identify the
7	courses to be taken in the first year of high school. Students who fail to meet the
8	standard for promotion to the ninth grade, pursuant to policies adopted by the State
9	Board of Elementary and Secondary Education, shall have any necessary remedial
10	courses included in their Individual Graduation Plan. The plan shall be reviewed
11	annually and updated as necessary to identify the courses to be taken each year until
12	all required core courses are completed.
13	(b) By the end of the eighth grade, each student's Individual Graduation Plan
14	shall include a plan for how the student can complete high school graduation
15	requirements by the end of grade eleven and qualify for a scholarship as provided in
16	R.S. 17:1609. The school counselor shall ensure that the student is informed of the
17	requirements of R.S. 17:1609 including that the availability of such scholarships is
18	subject to the appropriation of funds by the legislature for such purpose. The school
19	counselor shall be responsible for ensuring that the requirements of this
20	Subparagraph are met and that such requirements are in accordance with the early
21	high school graduation policy adopted by the State Board of Elementary and
22	Secondary Education and implemented by the city, parish, or other local public
23	school board as required in R.S. 17:7(30).

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Abstract: Require students' Individual Graduation Plans (IGP) to include plans on how to graduate early from high school and provides for using savings as a result of such early graduation to fund scholarships for such students and for administration of the Child Care Assistance Program.

<u>Present law</u> relative to Individual Graduation Plans, requires students in the 8th grade to develop a plan to explore educational and career possibilities and to make appropriate decisions as part of an overall career plan. Permits students to choose the high school curriculum framework and related graduation requirements that best meet their postsecondary goals. Provides that each student's plan shall include the recommended sequence of courses needed for successful completion of his chosen career major and shall be reviewed annually and updated as needed. Requires that a student's plan be signed by the student and his parent or other legal guardian.

<u>Proposed law</u> adds a requirement that by the end of the 8th grade, each student's IGP include a plan for how the student can complete high school by the end of 11th grade and qualify for an "Early College Scholarship" as provided in <u>proposed law</u>. Requires school counselors to ensure that the student is informed of <u>proposed law</u> including that the availability of the scholarships is subject to the appropriation of funds by the legislature for such purpose. Requires school counselors to ensure that the IGP includes these early graduation plans and that such plans comply with <u>present law</u> requirements that the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education adopt an early high school graduation policy and local public school boards implement such policy. Otherwise retains <u>present law</u>.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides for savings resulting from early high school graduates to be used for the following purposes:

- To provide an "Early College Scholarship" to a student who completes all high (1)school graduation requirements and receives a high school diploma by the end of 11th grade and enrolls in a La. public postsecondary education institution or an independent college or university that is a member of the La. Assoc. of Independent Colleges and Universities within one year of graduating. Provides for scholarship awards to be made by the La. Office of Student Financial Assistance, pursuant to rules adopted by the Bd. of Regents. Provides that the scholarship value shall be equal to 49% of the state Level I base per pupil amount contained in the minimum foundation program (MFP) formula, excluding any weights, and payments shall be made to the institution upon evidence of the student's enrollment. Provides that the scholarship is a one-time scholarship and prohibits scholarship renewal. Further provides that the Office of Student Financial Assistance shall receive an amount equal to 2% of the state Level I base per pupil amount contained in the MFP formula to defray the costs of administering the scholarship program. Provides that proposed law is subject to the appropriation of funds by the legislature.
- (2) To provide for more funding for the Child Care Assistance Program administered by the state Dept. of Education. Provides that the department shall receive an amount equal to 49% of the state Level I base per pupil amount contained in the MFP formula per early-graduating high school student to administer the Child Care Assistance Program. Provides that proposed law is subject to the appropriation of funds by the legislature.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires the state superintendent of education to annually report the following information to the governor, commissioner of administration, and legislature:

- (1) The number of students who graduated or are expected to graduate from high school in fewer than four years and the amount of state funding in the minimum foundation program formula that would have otherwise been appropriated to fund their education if they had not graduated early.
- (2) The estimated value and total cost of scholarships that such students are eligible to receive pursuant to proposed law.
- (3) The estimated number of children who could be served through the Child Care Assistance Program if the legislature appropriates funds for the program.

(Amends R.S. 17:22(11) and 2925(A)(2); Adds R.S. 17:22(12), 407.30, and 1609)

Summary of Amendments Adopted by House

- The Committee Amendments Proposed by <u>House Committee on Education</u> to the <u>original</u> bill:
- 1. Add requirement that the state superintendent of education annually report certain information relative to the number of early high school graduates and MFP funding for such students, the value and cost of the Early College Scholarships for such students, and the number of children who could be served through the Child Care Assistance Program if the legislature appropriates funds.
- 2. Add that a student may use an Early College Scholarship to enroll in any regionally accredited independent college and university that is a member of the La. Assoc. of Independent Colleges or Universities.
- 3. Change references to "base per pupil amount" to "state Level I base per pupil amount".

The House Floor Amendments to the engrossed bill:

1. Require school counselors to ensure that the student is informed of <u>proposed law</u> including that the availability of the scholarships is subject to the appropriation of funds by the legislature for such purpose.
