Gatti

<u>Proposed law</u> creates the crime of battery of a utility service employee. <u>Proposed law</u> defines battery of a utility service employee as a battery committed without the consent of the victim when the offender has reasonable grounds to believe the victim is a utility service employee acting in the performance of his employment duties.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides the following definitions:

- (1) "Utility service" means any electricity, gas, water, broadband, cable television, or telecommunications service.
- (2) "Utility service employee" means any uniformed, readily identifiable employee of any utility service.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that whoever commits the crime of battery of a utility service employee is to be fined up to \$500, or imprisoned for between 15 days and six months, or both. <u>Proposed law</u> further provides that at least 72 hours of any sentence of imprisonment must be served without benefit of suspension of sentence. However, <u>proposed law</u> provides that if the battery produces an injury requiring medical attention, the offender is to be fined up to \$5,000, or imprisoned with or without hard labor for between one and five years, or both.

Effective upon signature of the governor or lapse of time for gubernatorial action.
