HB 748

(KEYWORD, SUMMARY, AND DIGEST as amended by Senate committee amendments)

LICENSING: Provides relative to agencies engaged in regulatory and licensing activities

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## DIGEST

Present law provides relative to reports to the governor by regulatory agencies.

<u>Present law</u> authorizes the governor to request and receive, in such manner and at such time as he may direct, information relating to the activities of certain agencies.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> and requires the governor to review on an annual basis not less than 20% of the agencies engaged in regulatory and licensing activities.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that within five years, the governor shall have reviewed all such agencies.

Effective August 1, 2018.

(Amends R.S. 49:903)

Summary of Amendments Adopted by House

The House Floor Amendments to the engrossed bill:

- 1. Amend the definition of "certification".
- 2. Remove the definition of "speciality occupational license for medical reimbursement".
- 3. Remove the definition of "office" relative to the office of supervision of occupational boards.
- 4. Redesignate authority <u>from</u> the office of supervision of occupational boards <u>to</u> the office of the governor with respect to the responsibility for reviewing proposed legislation of occupations and relative to making reports to the legislature.
- 5. Remove the set of guidelines to be used for the evaluation of occupational regulations.
- 6. Remove provisions authorizing a person with a criminal record to petition an occupational licensing entity to determine whether the person's criminal record would disqualify such person from receiving the sought-after occupational license.
- 7. Require the La. Workforce Commission to establish reporting requirements relative to applicants with criminal records who apply to occupational licensing entities for occupational licenses.
- 8. Make technical changes.

## Summary of Amendments Adopted by Senate

<u>Committee Amendments Proposed by Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer</u> <u>Protection, and International Affairs to the reengrossed bill</u>

- 1. Deletes all provisions of the Occupational Licensing Review Act.
- 2. Requires the governor to review on an annual basis 20% of agencies engaged in regulatory and licensing activities.
- 3. Provides that all such agencies will be reviewed by governor within five years.
