Provides relative to the crime of improper supervision of a minor by a parent or legal custodian

<u>Present law</u> provides for the crime of improper supervision of a minor by a parent or legal custodian and <u>present law</u> penalties include a fine of not less than \$25 and not more than \$250 for each offense, imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or both. <u>Present law</u> provides that whoever violates the crime of improper supervision of a minor by allowing the minor to be habitually absent or tardy from school without a valid excuse is subject to being fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$250 for each offense, imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or both. <u>Present law</u> requires a minimum condition of probation to be imposed, including school or community service activities.

<u>Proposed law</u> changes the penalties to a fine of not more than \$500, imprisonment for not more than ninety days, or both and repeals the specific penalty for violation of improper supervision of a minor by allowing the minor to be habitually absent or tardy from school.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that a peace officer **may** issue a summons, in lieu of making an arrest, to any person who commits the offense of improper supervision of a minor in specifics instances.

EXPENDITURE EXPLANATION

<u>Proposed law</u> may result in an increase in Local Funds expenditures to the extent average sentences upon conviction for improper supervision of a minor by a parent or legal custodian increase as a result of changing the maximum imprisonment term from thirty (30) days to ninety (90) days. The total expenditure impact is indeterminable, but could be significant in large metropolitan areas and/or in the aggregate statewide. A conviction of the crime of improper supervision of a minor by a parent or legal custodian is a misdemeanor and would impact expenditures for local governing authorities based on present law.

REVENUE EXPLANATION

<u>Proposed law</u> may result in an indeterminable increase in Local Funds revenue as a result of potential fines if a person is convicted of improper supervision of a minor by a parent or legal custodian. <u>Present law</u> provides that penalties include a fine of not less than \$25 and not more than \$250 for each offense. <u>Present law</u> provides that whoever violates the crime of improper supervision of a minor by allowing the minor to be habitually absent or tardy from school without a valid excuse is subject to being fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$250 for each offense. <u>Proposed law</u> changes the penalties to a fine of not more than \$500. The potential net effect on sentencing decisions cannot be determined and the potential revenue impact is therefore unknown. The potential revenue will accrue to the local governing authority.
