TELECOMMUNICATIONS: Provides with respect to the assignment of wireless cell phone numbers to minors

AN ACT

2	To enact Chapter 60 of Title 51 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, to be comprised
3	of R.S. 51:3171 through 3176, relative to wireless telecommunication service; to
4	provide certain definitions; to provide relative to the assignment of wireless cell
5	phone numbers to minors; to provide relative to the disclosure of rights; to prohibit
6	discrimination; to provide for recovery of damages; and to provide for related
7	matters.
8	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
9	Section 1. Chapter 60 of Title 51 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950,
10	comprised of R.S. 51:3171 through 3176, is hereby enacted to read as follows:
11	CHAPTER 60. LOUISIANA WIRELESS CELL PHONE NUMBER ASSIGNMENT
12	FOR MINORS PROTECTION ACT
13	§3171. Short title
14	This Chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Louisiana Wireless
15	Cell Phone Number Assignment for Minors Protection Act".
16	§3172. Legislative findings
17	The legislature hereby finds and declares that:
18	(1) As required by the Federal Communications Commission's rules, the
19	North American Numbering Plan Administrator allocates a limited quantity of
20	wireless cell phone numbers to wireless telecommunication service providers,

2	telecommunication service providers to ensure the efficient use of wireless cell
3	phone numbers by reassigning a wireless cell phone number to a new consumer after
4	it is disconnected by the prior holder of the number.
5	(2) Wireless telecommunication service providers routinely recycle millions
6	of wireless cell phone numbers each year by returning the wireless cell phone
7	numbers to the providers' aging numbers pool for a period of time following
8	disconnection and by subsequently reassigning the wireless cell phone numbers to
9	new consumers. When a consumer is assigned a wireless cell phone number that
10	was previously assigned to the prior holder of the number, businesses and other
11	callers frequently do not learn of the reassignment right away and may inadvertently
12	call and reach the new consumer rather than the prior holder of the number.
13	(3) As wireless telecommunication service devices are increasingly used to
14	communicate in emergency situations, to access the internet, and to purchase goods
15	and services, reassigning and reusing wireless cell phone numbers can open the door
16	to a variety of unexpected phone calls and charges.
17	(4) Consumers obtaining wireless telecommunication service for use by a
18	minor need the opportunity to avoid wireless cell phone numbers that remained
19	unused for only short periods of time to lessen the likelihood that a minor will
20	receive calls that are intended for the prior holder of the number and of unwanted
21	charges.
22	§3173. Definitions
23	As used in this Chapter, the following terms have the meaning ascribed to
24	them in this Section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
25	(1) "Consumer" means an individual or entity who is a Louisiana resident
26	to whom a wireless service account or wireless cell phone number has been assigned
27	by a wireless telecommunication service provider, other than an account or wireless
28	cell phone number associated with prepaid wireless telecommunication service.

1	(2) "Minor" means an individual who has not attained the age of eighteen
2	years.
3	(3) "Wireless telecommunication service" means offers, rate plans, options,
4	wireless services, billing services, applications, programs, products, software, or
5	devices, as well as any other product or service offered or provided by wireless
6	telecommunication service providers to consumers.
7	(4) "Wireless telecommunication service provider" means an entity that
8	supplies wireless telecommunication services to users of wireless devices through
9	radio frequency signals rather than through end-to-end wire connection.
10	§3174. Assignment of wireless cell phone numbers to minors
1	A. No wireless telecommunication service provider shall reassign a wireless
12	cell phone number to a consumer who indicates that the wireless telecommunication
13	service is for use by a minor without first informing the consumer of how recently
14	the wireless cell phone number was assigned to a prior holder of the number.
15	B. If the wireless cell phone number was used by a prior holder of the
16	number within the last three hundred sixty-five days of the wireless cell phone
17	number reassignment, the consumer shall have the right to request a different
18	wireless cell phone number and to be assigned a wireless cell phone number that has
19	not been used by a prior holder of the number within the last three hundred sixty-five
20	days.
21	§3175. Notice of rights; disclosure; prohibition
22	A. When obtaining wireless telecommunication services for use by a minor,
23	a consumer shall have all of the following rights:
24	(1) To request that a wireless telecommunication service provider inform the
25	consumer if the wireless cell phone number that will be assigned to the minor was
26	assigned to a prior holder of the number within the last three hundred sixty-five days
27	of the date of the wireless cell phone number reassignment.
28	(2) To request a different wireless cell phone number when the wireless cell
29	phone number that will be assigned to the minor was assigned to a prior holder of the

1	number within the last three hundred sixty-five days of the date of the wireless cell
2	phone number reassignment.
3	(3) To be assigned a wireless cell phone number that has not been assigned
4	to a previous holder of the number within the last three hundred sixty-five days of
5	the date of the reassignment of the wireless cell phone number at no additional
6	charge.
7	B. In order to comply with this Chapter, a wireless telecommunication
8	service provider shall disclose to a consumer the consumer's rights pursuant to this
9	Chapter on the wireless telecommunication service provider's internet website or in
10	any other form that is reasonably accessible to consumers.
11	C. A wireless telecommunication service provider shall not discriminate
12	against a consumer because the consumer exercised any of the consumer's rights
13	pursuant to this Chapter, including but not limited to the following:
14	(1) Charging the consumer to change to a different wireless cell phone
15	<u>number.</u>
16	(2) Denying goods or services to the consumer.
17	(3) Charging different prices or rates for goods or services, including through
18	the use of discounts or other benefits or imposing penalties.
19	(4) Providing a different level or quality of goods or services to the
20	consumer.
21	§3176. Recovery of damages
22	A. A consumer who suffers any ascertainable loss of money as a result of a
23	wireless telecommunication service provider's failure to implement the provisions
24	of this Chapter may bring an action to recover actual damages.
25	B. In the event that damages are awarded pursuant to this Section, the court
26	shall award to the consumer bringing such action reasonable attorney fees and costs.
27	C. Upon a finding by the court that an action pursuant to this Section is
28	groundless and brought in bad faith or for purposes of harassment, the court may
29	award to the defendant reasonable attorney fees and costs.

**Abstract:** Regulates the assignment of wireless cell phone numbers by wireless telecommunication service providers to consumers when the service is for use by a minor.

<u>Proposed law</u> enacts the Louisiana Wireless Cell Phone Number Assignment for Minors Protection Act.

<u>Proposed law</u> defines the terms "consumer" and "wireless telecommunication service provider" for the purposes of <u>proposed law</u> in order to provide for clarification.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires wireless telecommunication service providers to inform consumers of how recently a wireless cell phone number was assigned to a prior holder of the number prior to assigning the number to the consumer when the consumer indicates that the service will be used by a minor.

Further, at the consumer's request, <u>proposed law</u> requires the wireless telecommunication service provider to assign a different wireless cell phone number, free of charge, when the wireless cell phone number that the provider will assign was used by a prior holder of the number within the last 365 days of the date of the reassignment.

<u>Proposed law</u> clarifies that <u>proposed law</u> is applicable only when the consumer is obtaining wireless telecommunication service that will be used by a minor.

<u>Proposed law</u> declares that a consumer obtaining services for use by a minor has the right to be informed if the wireless cell phone number that will be assigned to the minor was assigned to a prior holder of the number within the last 365 days and the right to request a different number without being charged. <u>Proposed law</u> requires wireless telecommunication service providers to disclose the consumer's rights pursuant to <u>proposed law</u> on the provider's website or in any other form that is reasonably accessible to consumers.

<u>Proposed law</u> prohibits wireless telecommunication service providers from discriminating against a consumer because the consumer exercised any of the consumer's rights under <u>proposed law</u>.

<u>Proposed law</u> authorizes a consumer to bring a civil action to recover actual damages and attorney fees and costs incurred as a result of a wireless telecommunication service provider's failure to implement <u>proposed law</u>. However, when the court finds that the consumer's civil action is groundless and brought in bad faith or to harass, the court may award the wireless telecommunication service provider attorney fees and costs.
