CONSUMERS/PROTECTION. Requests the Joint Legislative Committee on Technology and Cybersecurity to study the impacts of the buying, selling, and usage of consumer data transactions.

| 6 | beginning of the 2022 Regular Session of the Legislature of Louisiana. |
| 7 | WHEREAS, online consumer activity has experienced exponential growth in activity |
| 8 | over the last several years, with an increase of seventy percent prior to COVID-19 |
| 9 | pre-pandemic activity; and |
| 10 | WHEREAS, more than eighty percent of Americans are online every day, with |
| 11 | twenty-eight percent of Americans claiming they are constantly online, and forty-five |
| 12 | percent stating they are online several times a day; and |
| 13 | WHEREAS, companies use consumer data to track their activity patterns, including |
| 14 | click-based history, purchase orders, advertisement, interactions, and these companies then |
| 15 | sell the consumer user's data to third party companies; and |
| 16 | WHEREAS, nearly fifty percent of consumers feel they have little to no control of |
| 17 | their personal data, and the vast majority of consumers believe they should be able to opt out |
| 18 | of the sale of their data. |
