COUNSELORS/MENTAL HEALTH: Joins Louisiana to the licensed professional counselors interstate compact

AN ACT

2 To amend and reenact R.S. 37:1103(introductory paragraph) and to enact R.S. 37:1131 3 through 1145, relative to adding the state of Louisiana to the Licensed Professional 4 Counselors Interstate Compact; to provide for the increase of public access to 5 professional counseling services; to provide for the enhancement of public health and safety; to provide for multistate practice regulations; to provide for spousal support 6 7 for relocating active duty military personnel; to provide for the exchange of licensure 8 among member states; to provide for use of telehealth technology; to provide for 9 uniformity of professional counseling licensure requirements; to eliminate the 10 requirement for licenses in multiple states, to provide for opportunities for interstate 11 practice by licensed professional counselors who meet uniform licensure 12 requirements; and to provide for related matters. 13 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: 14 Section 1. R.S. 37:1103(introductory paragraph) is hereby amended and reenacted 15 and R.S. 37:1131 through 1145 are hereby enacted to read as follows: 16 §1103. Definitions 17 As used in this Chapter Part, the following terms have the meaning ascribed 18 to them in this Section: 19

1	§1131. Purpose
2	A. The purpose of this compact is to facilitate interstate practice of licensed
3	professional counselors with the goal of improving public access to professional
4	counseling services. The practice of professional counseling occurs in the state
5	where the client is located at the time of the counseling services. The compact
6	preserves the regulatory authority of states to protect public health and safety
7	through the current system of state licensure.
8	B. This compact is designed to achieve the following objectives:
9	(1) Increase public access to professional counseling services by providing
10	for the mutual recognition of other member state licenses.
11	(2) Enhance the states' ability to protect the public's health and safety.
12	(3) Encourage the cooperation of member states in regulating multistate
13	practice for licensed professional counselors.
14	(4) Support spouses of relocating active duty military personnel.
15	(5) Enhance the exchange of licensure, investigative and disciplinary
16	information among member states.
17	(6) Allow for the use of telehealth technology to facilitate increased access
18	to professional counseling services.
19	(7) Support the uniformity of professional counseling licensure requirements
20	throughout the states to promote public safety and public health benefits.
21	(8) Invest all member states with the authority to hold a licensed professional
22	counselor accountable for meeting all state practice laws in the state in which the
23	client is located at the time care is rendered through the mutual recognition of
24	member state licenses.
25	(9) Eliminate the necessity for licenses in multiple states.
26	(10) Provide opportunities for interstate practice by licensed professional
27	counselors who meet uniform licensure requirements.

1	§1132. Definitions
2	As used in this compact, and except as otherwise provided, the following
3	definitions shall apply:
4	(1) "Active duty military" means full-time duty status in the active
5	uniformed service of the United States, including members of the National Guard
6	and Reserve on active duty orders pursuant to 10 U.S.C. Chapters 1209 and 1211.
7	(2) "Adverse action" means any administrative, civil, equitable or criminal
8	action permitted by a state's laws which is imposed by a licensing board or other
9	authority against a licensed professional counselor, including actions against an
10	individual's license or privilege to practice such as revocation, suspension,
11	probation, monitoring of the licensee, limitation on the licensee's practice, or any
12	other encumbrance on licensure affecting a licensed professional counselor's
13	authorization to practice, including issuance of a cease and desist action.
14	(3) "Alternative program" means a non disciplinary monitoring or practice
15	remediation process approved by a professional counseling licensing board to
16	address impaired practitioners.
17	(4) "Continuing competence" or "continuing education" means a
18	requirement, as a condition of license renewal, to provide evidence of participation
19	in, or completion of, educational and professional activities relevant to practice or
20	area of work.
21	(5) "Counseling Compact Commission" or "commission" means the national
22	administrative body whose membership consists of all states that have enacted the
23	compact.
24	(6) "Current significant investigative information" means either of the
25	following:
26	(a) Investigative information that a licensing board, after a preliminary
27	inquiry that includes notification and an opportunity for the licensed professional
28	counselor to respond, if required by state law, has reason to believe is not groundless

and, if proved true, would indicate more than a minor infraction.

1	(b) Investigative information that indicates that the licensed professional
2	counselor represents an immediate threat to public health and safety regardless of
3	whether the licensed professional counselor has been notified and had an opportunity
4	to respond.
5	(7) "Data system" means a repository of information about licensees,
6	including, but not limited to, continuing education, examination, licensure,
7	investigative, privilege to practice and adverse action information.
8	(8) "Encumbered license" means a license in which an adverse action
9	restricts the practice of licensed professional counseling by the licensee and said
10	adverse action has been reported to the National Practitioners Data Bank (NPDB).
11	(9) "Encumbrance" means a revocation or suspension of, or any limitation
12	on, the full and unrestricted practice of licensed professional counseling by a
13	licensing board.
14	(10) "Executive committee" means a group of directors elected or appointed
15	to act on behalf of, and within the powers granted to them by, the commission.
16	(11) "Home state" means the member state that is the licensee's primary
17	state of residence.
18	(12) "Impaired practitioner" means an individual who has a condition(s) that
19	may impair their ability to practice as a licensed professional counselor without some
20	type of intervention and may include, but are not limited to, alcohol and drug
21	dependence, mental health impairment, and neurological or physical impairments.
22	(13) "Investigative information" means information, records, and documents
23	received or generated by a professional counseling licensing board pursuant to an
24	investigation.
25	(14) "Jurisprudence requirement", if required by a member state, means the
26	assessment of an individual's knowledge of the laws and rules governing the practice
27	of professional counseling in a state.

1	(15) "Licensed professional counselor" shall mean a counselor licensed by
2	a member state, regardless of the title used by that state, to independently assess,
3	diagnose, and treat behavioral health conditions.
4	(16) "Licensee" means an individual who currently holds an authorization
5	from the state to practice as a licensed professional counselor.
6	(17) "Licensing board" means the agency of a state, or equivalent, that is
7	responsible for the licensing and regulation of licensed professional counselors.
8	(18) "Member state" means a state that has enacted the compact.
9	(19) "Privilege to practice" means a legal authorization, which is equivalent
10	to a license, permitting the practice of professional counseling in a remote state.
11	(20) "Professional counseling" means the assessment, diagnosis, and
12	treatment of behavioral health conditions by a licensed professional counselor.
13	(21) "Remote state" means a member state other than the home state, where
14	a licensee is exercising or seeking to exercise the privilege to practice.
15	(22) "Rule" means a regulation promulgated by the commission that has the
16	force of law.
17	(23) "Single state license" means a licensed professional counselor license
18	issued by a member state that authorizes practice only within the issuing state and
19	does not include a privilege to practice in any other member state.
20	(24) "State" means any state, commonwealth, district, or territory of the
21	United States of America that regulates the practice of professional counseling.
22	(25) "Telehealth" means the application of telecommunication technology
23	to deliver professional counseling services remotely to assess, diagnose, and treat
24	behavioral health conditions.
25	(26) "Unencumbered license" means a license that authorizes a licensed
26	professional counselor to engage in the full and unrestricted practice of professional
27	counseling.
28	§1133. State participation in the compact
29	A. To participate in the compact, a state shall currently:

1	(1) License and regulate licensed professional counselor.
2	(2) Require licensees to pass a nationally recognized exam approved by the
3	commission.
4	(3) Require licensees to have a sixty-hour master's degree in counseling or
5	sixty hours of graduate course work in the following areas:
6	(a) Professional counseling orientation and ethical practice.
7	(b) Social and cultural diversity.
8	(c) Human growth and development.
9	(d) Career development.
10	(e) Counseling and helping relationships.
11	(f) Group counseling and group work.
12	(g) Assessment and testing.
13	(h) Research and program evaluation.
14	(4) Require licensees to complete a supervised postgraduate professional
15	experience as defined by the commission.
16	(5) Have a mechanism in place for receiving and investigating complaints
17	about licensees.
18	B. A member state shall:
19	(1) Participate fully in the commission's data system, including using the
20	commission's unique identifier as defined in rules.
21	(2) Notify the commission, in compliance with the terms of the compact and
22	rules, of any adverse action or the availability of investigative information regarding
23	a licensee.
24	(3)(a) Implement or utilize procedures for considering the criminal history
25	records of applicants for an initial privilege to practice. These procedures shall
26	include the submission of fingerprints or other biometric-based information by
27	applicants for the purpose of obtaining an applicant's criminal history record
28	information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the agency responsible for
29	retaining that state's criminal records.

1	(b) A member state shall fully implement a criminal background check
2	requirement, within a time frame established by rule, by receiving the results of the
3	Federal Bureau of Investigation record search on criminal background checks and
4	use the results in making licensure decisions.
5	(c) Communication between a member state, the commission, and among
6	member states regarding the verification of eligibility for licensure through the
7	compact shall not include any information received from the Federal Bureau of
8	Investigation relating to a federal criminal records check performed by a member
9	state under Public Law 92-544.
10	(4) Comply with the rules of the commission.
11	(5) Require an applicant to obtain or retain a license in the home state and
12	meet the home state's qualifications for licensure or renewal of licensure, as well as
13	all other applicable state laws.
14	(6) Grant the privilege to practice to a licensee holding a valid
15	unencumbered license in another member state in accordance with the terms of the
16	compact and rules.
17	(7) Provide for the state commissioner's attendance of the Counseling
18	Compact Commission meetings.
19	C. Member states may charge a fee for granting the privilege to practice.
20	D. Individuals not residing in a member state shall continue to be able to
21	apply for a member state's single state license as provided under the laws of each
22	member state. However, the single state license granted to these individuals shall not
23	be recognized as granting a privilege to practice professional counseling in any other
24	member state.
25	E. Nothing in this compact shall affect the requirements established by a
26	member state for the issuance of a single state license.
27	F. A license issued to a licensed professional counselor by a home state to
28	a resident in that state shall be recognized by each member state as authorizing a

1	licensed professional counselor to practice professional counseling, under a privilege
2	to practice, in each member state.
3	§1134. Privilege to practice
4	A. To exercise the privilege to practice under the terms and provisions of the
5	compact, the licensee shall do all of the following:
6	(1) Hold a license in the home state.
7	(2) Have no encumbrances on any state license.
8	(3) Have a valid United States Social Security Number or National
9	Practitioner Identifier.
10	(4) Be eligible for a privilege to practice in any member state in accordance
11	with Subsections D, G, and H of this Section.
12	(5) Have not had any encumbrance or restriction against any license or
13	privilege to practice within the previous two years.
14	(6) Notify the commission that the licensee is seeking the privilege to
15	practice within a remote state.
16	(7) Meet any continuing competence or continuing education requirements
17	established by the home state
18	(8) Pay any applicable fees, including any state fee, for the privilege to
19	practice.
20	(9) Meet any jurisprudence requirements established by any remote state in
21	which the licensee is seeking a privilege to practice.
22	(10) Report to the commission any adverse action, encumbrance, or
23	restriction on license taken by any non-member state within thirty days from the date
24	the action is taken.
25	B. The privilege to practice is valid until the expiration date of the home
26	license. The licensee shall comply with the requirements of Subsection A of this
27	Section to maintain the privilege to practice in the remote state.
28	C. A licensee providing professional counseling in a remote state under the
29	privilege to practice shall adhere to the laws and regulations of the remote state.

1	D. A licensee providing professional counseling services in a remote state
2	is subject to that state's regulatory authority. A remote state may, in accordance with
3	due process and that state's laws, remove a licensee's privilege to practice in the
4	remote state for a specific period of time, impose fines, and take any other necessary
5	actions to protect the health and safety of its citizens. The licensee is not eligible for
6	a privilege to practice in any member state until the specific time for removal has
7	passed and all fines are paid.
8	E. If a home state license is encumbered, the licensee shall lose the privilege
9	to practice in any remote state until all of the following occur:
10	(1) The home state license is no longer encumbered.
11	(2) He has not had any encumbrance or restriction against any license or
12	privilege to practice within the previous two years.
13	F. Once an encumbered license in the home state is restored to good
14	standing, the licensee shall meet the requirements of Subsection A of the Section to
15	obtain a privilege to practice in any remote state.
16	G. If a licensee's privilege to practice in any remote state is removed, the
17	licensee shall lose the privilege to practice in all other remote states until all of the
18	following have occurred:
19	(1) The specific period of time for which the privilege to practice was
20	removed has ended.
21	(2) All fines have been paid.
22	(3) The licensee has not had any encumbrance or restriction against any
23	license or privilege to practice within the previous two years.
24	H. Once the requirements of Subsection G of this Section have been met, the
25	licensee shall meet the requirements in Subsection A of this Section to obtain a
26	privilege to practice in a remote state.
27	§1135. Obtaining a new home state license based upon the privilege to practice
28	A. A licensed professional counselor may hold a license issued by the home
29	state, which allows for a privilege to practice, in only one member state at a time.

1	B. If a licensed professional counselor changes his primary state of residence
2	by moving between two member states:
3	(1) The licensed professional counselor shall file an application for obtaining
4	a new home state license based on a privilege to practice, pay all applicable fees, and
5	notify the current and new home state in accordance with applicable rules adopted
6	by the commission.
7	(2) Upon receipt of an application for obtaining a new home state license by
8	virtue of a privilege to practice, the new home state shall verify that the licensed
9	professional counselor meets the pertinent criteria outlined in Section 4 via the data
10	system, without need for primary source verification except for:
11	(a) A Federal Bureau of Investigation fingerprint-based criminal background
12	check if not previously performed or updated pursuant to applicable rules adopted
13	by the commission in accordance with Public Law 92-544.
14	(b) Other criminal background checks as required by the new home state.
15	(c) Completion of any requisite jurisprudence requirements of the new home
16	state.
17	(3) The former home state shall convert the former home state license into
18	a privilege to practice once the new home state has activated the new home state
19	license in accordance with applicable rules adopted by the commission.
20	(4) If a licensed professional counselor does not meet the criteria for a
21	privilege to practice described in R.S. 37:1134, the new home state for the licensed
22	professional counselor shall apply its requirements for issuing a new single-state
23	license.
24	(5) The licensed professional counselor who obtains a new home state
25	license by the criteria described in this Section shall pay all applicable fees to the
26	new home state in order to be issued a new home state license.
27	C. If a licensed professional counselor changes his primary state of residence
28	by moving from a member state to a non-member state, or from a non-member state

1	to a member state, the state criteria shall apply for issuance of a single-state license
2	in the new state.
3	D. Nothing in this compact shall interfere with a licensee's ability to hold a
4	single-state license in multiple states; however for the purposes of this compact, a
5	licensee shall have only one home state license.
6	E. Nothing in this Section shall affect the requirements established by a
7	member state for the issuance of a single-state license.
8	§1136. Active duty military personnel or his spouses
9	Active duty military personnel, or the spouse of an active duty member of the
10	military, shall designate a home state where the individual has a current license in
11	good standing. The individual may retain the home state designation during the
12	period the service member is on active duty. Subsequent to designating a home state,
13	the individual shall only change his home state through application for licensure in
14	the new state.
15	§1137. Compact privilege to practice telehealth
16	A. Member states shall recognize the right of a licensed professional
17	counselor, licensed by a home state in accordance with R.S.37:1133 and under rules
18	promulgated by the commission, to practice professional counseling in any member
19	state via telehealth under a privilege to practice as provided in the compact and rules
20	promulgated by the commission.
21	B. A licensee providing professional counseling services in a remote state
22	under the privilege to practice shall adhere to the laws and regulations of the remote
23	state.
24	§1138. Adverse actions
25	A.(1) In addition to the other powers conferred by state law, a remote state
26	shall have the authority, in accordance with the existing state due process law, to:
27	(a) Take adverse action against a licensed professional counselor's privilege
28	to practice within that member state.

(b) Issue subpoenas for both hearings and investigations that require the
attendance and testimony of witnesses as well as the production of evidence.
Subpoenas issued by a licensing board in a member state for the attendance and
testimony of witnesses or the production of evidence from another member state
shall be enforced in the latter state by any court of competent jurisdiction, according
to the practice and procedure of that court applicable to subpoenas issued in
proceedings pending before it. The issuing authority shall pay any witness fees,
travel expenses, mileage, and other fees required by the service statutes of the state
in which the witnesses or evidence are located.
(2) Only the home state shall have the power to take adverse action against
a licensed professional counselor's license issued by the home state.
B. For purposes of taking adverse action, the home state shall give the same
priority and effect to reported conduct received from a member state as it would if
the conduct had occurred within the home state. In so doing, the home state shall
apply its own state laws to determine appropriate action.
C. The home state shall complete any pending investigations of a licensed
professional counselor who changes his primary state of residence during the course
of the investigations. The home state shall also have the authority to take appropriate
action and shall promptly report the conclusions of the investigations to the
administrator of the data system. The administrator of the coordinated licensure
information system shall promptly notify the new home state of any adverse actions.
D. A member state, if otherwise permitted by state law, may recover from
the affected licensed professional counselor the costs of investigations and
disposition of cases resulting from any adverse action taken against that licensed
professional counselor.
E. A member state may take adverse action based on the factual findings of
the remote state, provided that the member state follows its own procedures for
taking the adverse action.
F Loint Investigations:

1	(1) In addition to the authority granted to a member state by its respective
2	professional counseling practice act or other applicable state law, any member state
3	may participate with other member states in joint investigations of licensees.
4	(2) Member states shall share any investigative, litigation, or compliance
5	materials in furtherance of any joint or individual investigation initiated under the
6	compact.
7	G. If adverse action is taken by the home state against the license of a
8	licensed professional counselor, the licensed professional counselor's privilege to
9	practice in all other member states shall be deactivated until all encumbrances have
10	been removed from the state license. All home state disciplinary orders that impose
11	adverse action against the license of a licensed professional counselor shall include
12	a statement that the licensed professional counselor's privilege to practice is
13	deactivated in all member states during the pendency of the order.
14	H. If a member state takes adverse action, it shall promptly notify the
15	administrator of the data system. The administrator of the data system shall
16	promptly notify the home state of any adverse actions by remote states.
17	I. Nothing in this compact shall override a member state's decision that
18	participation in an alternative program may be used in lieu of adverse action.
19	§1139. Establishment of Counseling Compact Commission
20	A.(1) The compact member states hereby create and establish a joint public
21	agency known as the Counseling Compact Commission.
22	(2) The commission is an instrumentality of the compact states.
23	(3) Venue is proper and judicial proceedings by or against the commission
24	shall be brought solely and exclusively in a court of competent jurisdiction where the
25	principal office of the commission is located. The commission may waive venue and
26	jurisdictional defenses to the extent it adopts or consents to participate in alternative
27	dispute resolution proceedings.
28	(4) Nothing in this Section shall be construed to be a waiver of sovereign
29	immunity.

1	B. All of the following provisions shall apply to the membership, voting, and
2	meeting of the commission:
3	(1) Each member state shall have and be limited to one delegate selected by
4	that member state's licensing board.
5	(2) The delegate shall be a current member of the licensing board at the time
6	of appointment, who is a licensed professional counselor, public member, or the
7	board administrator.
8	(3) Any delegate may be removed or suspended from office as provided by
9	the laws of the state from which the delegate is appointed.
10	(4) The member state licensing board shall fill any vacancy occurring on the
11	commission within sixty days.
12	(5) Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote with regard to the
13	promulgation of rules and creation of bylaws and shall otherwise have an opportunity
14	to participate in the business and affairs of the commission.
15	(6) A delegate shall vote in person or by such other means as provided in the
16	bylaws. The bylaws may provide for delegates' participation in meetings by
17	telephone or other means of communication.
18	(7) The commission shall meet at least once during each calendar year.
19	Additional meetings shall be held as set forth in the bylaws.
20	(8) The commission shall by rule establish a term of office for delegates and
21	may by rule establish term limits.
22	C. The commission shall have power to carry out all of the following duties:
23	(1) Establish the fiscal year of the commission.
24	(2) Establish bylaws.
25	(3) Maintain its financial records in accordance with the bylaws.
26	(4) Meet and take such actions as are consistent with the provisions of this
27	compact and the bylaws.
28	(5) Promulgate rules which shall be binding to the extent and in the manner
29	provided for in the compact.

1	(6) Bring and prosecute legal proceedings or actions in the name of the
2	commission, provided that the standing of any state counselor licensing board to sue
3	or be sued under applicable law shall not be affected.
4	(7) Purchase and maintain insurance and bonds.
5	(8) Borrow, accept, or contract for services of personnel including but not
6	limited to employees of a member state.
7	(9) Hire employees, elect or appoint officers, fix compensation, define
8	duties, grant such individuals appropriate authority to carry out the purposes of the
9	compact, and to establish the commission's personnel policies and programs relating
10	to conflicts of interest, qualifications of personnel, and other related personnel
11	<u>matters.</u>
12	(10) Accept any and all appropriate donations and grants of money,
13	equipment, supplies, materials, and services and to receive, utilize, and dispose of
14	the same; provided that at all times the commission shall avoid any appearance of
15	impropriety or conflict of interest.
16	(11) Lease, purchase, accept appropriate gifts or donations of, or otherwise
17	to own, hold, improve, or use, any property, real, personal or mixed; provided that
18	at all times the commission shall avoid any appearance of impropriety.
19	(12) Sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchange, abandon, or otherwise
20	dispose of any property real, personal, or mixed.
21	(13) Establish a budget and make expenditures.
22	(14) Borrow money.
23	(15) Appoint committees, including standing committees composed of
24	members, state regulators, state legislators or their representatives, and consumer
25	representatives, and such other interested persons as may be designated in this
26	compact and the bylaws.
27	(16) Provide and receive information from, and cooperate with, law
28	enforcement agencies.
29	(17) Establish and elect an executive committee.

1	(18) Perform such other functions as may be necessary or appropriate to
2	achieve the purposes of this compact consistent with the state regulation of
3	professional counseling licensure and practice.
4	D. The executive committee shall have the power to act on behalf of the
5	commission according to the terms of this Section, including all of the following
6	terms:
7	(1)(a) The executive committee shall be composed of up to eleven members.
8	(b) Seven voting members shall be elected by the commission from the
9	current membership of the commission.
10	(c) Up to four ex-officio, nonvoting members shall be from four recognized
1	national professional counselor organizations.
12	(d) The ex-officio members will be selected by their respective
13	organizations.
14	(2) The commission may remove any member of the executive committee
15	as provided in bylaws.
16	(3) The executive committee shall meet at least annually.
17	(4) The executive committee shall have the following duties and
18	responsibilities, including all of the following:
19	(a) Recommend to the entire commission changes to the rules or bylaws,
20	changes to this compact legislation, fees paid by compact member states such as
21	annual dues, and any commission compact fee charged to licensees for the privilege
22	to practice.
23	(b) Ensure compact administration services are appropriately provided,
24	contractual or otherwise.
25	(c) Prepare and recommend the budget.
26	(d) Maintain financial records on behalf of the commission.
27	(e) Monitor compact compliance of member states and provide compliance
28	reports to the commission.
29	(f) Establish additional committees as necessary.

1	(g) Other duties, as provided in rules or bylaws.
2	(5) Meetings of the commission.
3	(a) All meetings shall be open to the public, and public notice of meetings
4	shall be given in the same manner as required under the rulemaking provisions in
5	R.S. 37:1141.
6	(b) The commission or the executive committee or other committees of the
7	commission may convene in a closed, non-public meeting if the commission or
8	executive committee or other committees of the commission discuss any of the
9	following:
10	(i) Non-compliance of a member state with its obligations under the
11	compact.
12	(ii) The employment, compensation, discipline or other matters, practices,
13	or procedures related to specific employees or other matters related to the
14	commission's internal personnel practices and procedures.
15	(iii) Current, threatened, or reasonably anticipated litigation.
16	(iv) Negotiation of contracts for the purchase, lease, or sale of goods,
17	services, or real estate.
18	(v) Accusing any person of a crime or formally censuring any person.
19	(vi) Disclosure of trade secrets or commercial or financial information that
20	is privileged or confidential.
21	(vii) Disclosure of information of a personal nature where disclosure would
22	constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.
23	(viii) Disclosure of investigative records compiled for law enforcement
24	purposes.
25	(ix) Disclosure of information related to any investigative reports prepared
26	by or on behalf of or for use of the commission or other committee charged with
27	responsibility of investigation or determination of compliance issues pursuant to this
28	Section.

1	(x) Matters specifically exempted from disclosure by federal or member state
2	statute.
3	(c) If a meeting, or portion of a meeting, is closed pursuant to this Paragraph,

revision shall be subject to challenge by any person for a period of thirty days after
posting. The revision may be challenged only on grounds that the revision results
in a material change to a rule. A challenge shall be made in writing and delivered
to the chair of the commission prior to the end of the notice period. If no challenge
is made, the revision shall take effect without further action. If the revision is
challenged, the revision may not take effect without the approval of the commission.
§1142. Oversight; dispute resolution; enforcement
All of the following provisions shall apply with respect to the compact:
(1) The executive, legislative, and judicial branches of state government in
each member state shall enforce this compact and take all actions necessary and
appropriate to effectuate the compact's purposes and intent. The provisions of this
compact and the rules promulgated hereunder shall have standing as statutory law.
(2) All courts shall take judicial notice of the compact and the rules in any
judicial or administrative proceeding in a member state pertaining to the subject
