SPECIAL DAY/WEEK/MONTH. Recognizes Tuesday, March 19, 2024, as Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) Day at the Louisiana State Capitol.

1	A RESOLUTION
2	To recognize Tuesday, March 19, 2024, as Historically Black Colleges and Universities
3	(HBCU) Day at the Louisiana State Capitol.
4	WHEREAS, Louisiana is proud to be home to eight Historically Black Colleges and
5	Universities: Dillard University, Grambling State University, Southern University and A&M
6	College, Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, Southern
7	University Law Center, Southern University at New Orleans, Southern University
8	Shreveport, and Xavier University of Louisiana; and
9	WHEREAS, Louisiana is also home to the nation's only HBCU System, the Southern
10	University System, which is uniquely positioned as an exemplar with a profound
11	commitment to research and student success and whose Board of Supervisors is celebrating
12	fifty years of service to the students, faculty, staff, and community surrounding the system's
13	five campuses in Baton Rouge, New Orleans, and Shreveport; and
14	WHEREAS, Grambling State University and Southern University and A&M College
15	celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the Bayou Classic, an annual extravaganza that brings
16	fans, supporters, and alumni of both universities for a celebration of football, family, and
17	tradition in New Orleans; and
18	WHEREAS, it would be remiss not to welcome two new leaders of Louisiana's

1	HBCU presidents to the state: Dr. Martin Lemelle and Dr. Aubra J. Gantt; and
2	WHEREAS, the University of Louisiana System welcomed new leadership in 2024,
3	in naming Dr. Martin Lemelle as the eleventh President of Grambling State University; and
4	WHEREAS, Dr. Lemelle, a 2006 graduate and former Student Government
5	Association President of Grambling, recently served as the Executive Vice President and
6	Chief Financial Officer at Maryland Institute College of Art and prior to his service at
7	Maryland Institute College of Art, Dr. Lemelle was the Executive Vice President and Chief
8	Operating Officer at Grambling State University from 2016 to 2021, developing extensive
9	experience in higher education administration and preparing him for his new leadership role
10	at the university; and
11	WHEREAS, on March 17, 2023, Dr. Aubra J. Gantt, became Chancellor of Southern
12	University at Shreveport; and
13	WHEREAS, Dr. Gantt began her educational career at SUSLA, where she learned
14	one of her passions was to serve students, faculty, and staff from various backgrounds; and
15	WHEREAS, Dr. Gantt is a believer in the community college mission because she
16	is a product of a community college; and
17	WHEREAS, since their establishment 188 years ago, HBCUs have continued to build
18	a legacy of excellence, achievement, and inclusion; and
19	WHEREAS, HBCUs were created to provide opportunities and access to education
20	for Black students during a time when institutions of higher education discriminated against
21	Black Americans; and
22	WHEREAS, the establishment and advancement of HBCUs fostered academic
23	excellence, cultural empowerment, and professional readiness for Black students throughout
24	our nation; and
25	WHEREAS, HBCUs play a crucial role in contributing to the economy and
26	workforce, aligning their academic programs with the needs of industry while ensuring
27	HBCU graduates meet the demands of the job market; and
28	WHEREAS, HBCU graduates are exemplary public servants, scientists, doctors,
29	artists, lawyers, judges, engineers, educators, entertainers, business owners, and leaders and
30	have distinguished themselves in numerous ways, both nationally and in the state as follows:

1	Dillard University is recognized for its Ray Charles Program in African American
2	Material Culture, to which the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation awarded a significant grant
3	for a multi-year project titled "Higher Learning through Humanities in Food Studies"; and
4	Grambling State University, with a legacy spanning nearly 122 years, pioneered
5	Louisiana's first Doctor of Philosophy program in Criminology and Justice Administration,
6	receiving student scholarships from Beyoncé's "BeyGood" Foundation that showcase the
7	institution's commitment to innovation and student support; and
8	Southern University and A&M College, a Carnegie Research 2 institution, was
9	awarded a grant to aid in the pursuit of the Carnegie Research 1 high research activity
10	designation, and received with the Boeing Co., a joint award from NASA for their combined
11	work on NASA's Space Launch System (SLS) rocket; and
12	Southern University at New Orleans is celebrating sixty-five years of providing
13	access to educational opportunities for students; is in the process of designing a new nursing
14	building; recently enrolled its first Cybersecurity cohort this past fall, and formalized an
15	articulation agreement for a Cybersecurity Degree Pathway with Delgado Community
16	College to train future cybersecurity practitioners to meet workforce needs in the field of
17	information technology; and
18	Southern University Shreveport, celebrating fifty-six years of providing an
19	excellent and accessible educational experience to students and programming for its
20	surrounding community, has acquired a new Mobile Health Unit, which will travel across
21	Northwest Louisiana providing quality health and dental screenings to underserved
22	populations and bringing healthcare to communities that would otherwise not receive these
23	services; and
24	Southern University Law Center, a highly ranked legal education institution, has
25	prospered within the Esports industry, hosting regional and national tournaments in the
26	newly established Esports Innovation Lab; and
27	Xavier University of Louisiana, known for being the top producer of Black
28	graduates who earn medical degrees, was recently recognized by OnlineU as the
29	second-ranked HBCU in the nation, with the highest payoff for Black graduates in 2024; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate to commend Louisiana's Historically Black Colleges
