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HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 66

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEES: Provides for a joint legislative committee to study regulations regarding artificial intelligence

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2	To create and provide with respect to a special joint legislative committee to study and make
3	recommendations with respect to the use and regulation of artificial intelligence.
4	WHEREAS, the Legislature of Louisiana recognizes its responsibility for the health,
5	safety, and welfare of the state's citizens and is increasingly concerned about how artificial
6	intelligence, if used with nefarious intent, may pose a threat to the well-being of those
7	citizens; and
8	WHEREAS, the potential threats are multifaceted and do not fall squarely within the
9	subject matter jurisdiction of any particular legislative committee as prescribed by the rules
10	of the respective chambers; and
11	WHEREAS, education policy is implicated in the potential for using artificial
12	intelligence to assist in test-taking and paper-writing, thus threatening the most common
13	methods teachers at all levels use to assess what students have learned; and
14	WHEREAS, administration of criminal justice policy is implicated in the potential
15	for manufacturing or otherwise manipulating evidence used in the prosecution of crimes; and
16	WHEREAS, financial policy is implicated in the potential for disruption of
17	commercial transactions and currency exchanges and the undermining of the trust that makes
18	free enterprise possible; and
19	WHEREAS, the fiscal health of the state is implicated in the tools that artificial
20	intelligence allows for disguising assets and transferring of wealth in ways and forms that

1 are untraceable, which threatens the state's ability to collect revenue equitably and 2 sufficiently to fund state services; and 3 WHEREAS, the legislature also recognizes there may be beneficent uses of artificial 4 intelligence that could improve the operations of state government and the efficiency and 5 effectiveness with which it administers services to citizens; and 6 WHEREAS, the legislature needs a great deal more information before it can begin 7 to fashion policies that exploit the potential tools that artificial intelligence provides for 8 governance while limiting its abuse by those who would do harm to our state and its citizens. 9 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby 10 create a special joint legislative committee, composed of members as hereinafter provided, 11 to study and make recommendations with respect to the use and regulation of artificial 12 intelligence. 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the joint committee shall be composed of five 14 members of the House of Representatives appointed by the speaker of the House and five 15 members of the Senate appointed by the president of the Senate; the speaker of the House 16 shall call the first meeting of the joint committee; at the first meeting of the joint committee, 17 the members from each chamber shall elect from among themselves someone to serve as 18 chair of the joint committee, and the two members so selected shall each serve one-year 19 terms as chair of the joint committee on an alternating basis; the member of the House of 20 Representatives shall serve the initial term as chair. 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the joint committee shall actively solicit data 22 and testimony from persons, entities, agencies, and institutions that it believes can contribute 23 to its purpose. 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the joint committee shall make annual reports 25 on policy recommendations to the legislature.
