Abstract: Establishes procedures for healthcare professionals providing care for patients suffering from behavioral health issues.

<u>Proposed law</u> states that if a patient is admitted for inpatient behavioral healthcare services as a result of an emergency certificate issued by a physician, the inpatient healthcare facility shall make a reasonable effort to do all of the following:

- (1) Notify any healthcare professional treating the patient for a behavioral healthcare condition that the patient is to be discharged if such notification is requested by the patient.
- (2) Notify any healthcare professional scheduled to provide follow-up behavioral healthcare services of the patient's discharge no later than date that the patient is scheduled for follow-up services. The notice shall include of a summary of the patient's condition and any medically relevant information.
- (3) Provide the patient educational documents created and published by the La. Department of Health prior to discharge explaining the signs of self-harm and the importance of seeking follow-up care.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that a healthcare professional that offers behavioral health services may accept documents from the family, friends, loved ones, and caregivers of the patient about the patient's condition. <u>Proposed law</u> further provides that healthcare professional may add relevant documentation to the patient's medical record.

Summary of Amendments Adopted by House

The Committee Amendments Proposed by <u>House Committee on Health and Welfare</u> to the original bill:

- 1. Add that healthcare professionals may communicate via telephone conversation to satisfy the requirements of this proposed law.
- 2. Add that the La. Department of Health shall create and publish educational documents about the risks to a patient after discharge from an admission pursuant to an emergency

certification.

3. Provide that a healthcare provider has the discretion to include collected documentation from family, friends, loved ones, and caregivers about the patient's condition in the patient's medical record.
