HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 72

BY REPRESENTATIVES LAFLEUR, BRASS, CARPENTER, CARVER, FREIBERG, SCHLEGEL, TAYLOR, AND YOUNG

SCHOOLS: Creates a task force and requests the State Department of Education to study and report relative to school start times

1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION
2	To create a task force and urge and request the State Department of Education to conduct a
3	comprehensive study on school start times and submit written reports of findings and
4	recommendations to the House Committee on Education and the Senate Committee
5	on Education not later than February 1, 2025.
6	WHEREAS, sufficient sleep is essential for the healthy development and daily
7	functioning of children and adolescents, and emerging research suggests that later school
8	start times promote better sleep hygiene, which leads to improved health, academic
9	performance, graduation rates, school attendance, behavior, and overall well-being among
10	students; and
11	WHEREAS, a significant number of schools and school districts in Louisiana suffer
12	from high rates of truancy and chronic absenteeism and low academic achievement; and
13	WHEREAS, adjusting school start times to align more closely with adolescents'
14	natural sleep is an evidence-based strategy to improve attendance rates, enhance students'
15	ability to learn, and contribute to the overall success and welfare of Louisiana's youth; and
16	WHEREAS, research demonstrates that the majority of adolescents are sleep
17	deprived at school, that the natural biological rhythms of adolescents are a poor fit with early
18	school start times, and that most adolescents get their best sleep between 11:00 p.m. and
19	8:00 a.m.; and

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WHEREAS, many national organizations, such as the American Academy of Pediatrics, American Medical Association, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, recommend later school start times, particularly for middle school and high school students; and WHEREAS, the need to start the high school day later is a public health concern:

5 WHEREAS, the need to start the high school day later is a public health concern; 6 sleep loss in adolescents has been associated with increased risk of obesity, eating disorders, 7 and cardiovascular morbidity, which are likely to lead to increasingly poor health and mental 8 instability as adolescents progress to adulthood; and

9 WHEREAS, additionally, research identifies numerous consequences and impacts 10 on adolescent brain development associated with sleep deprivation, including lack of 11 attention to learning tasks, poor retention of information taught, low grades, increased risk 12 of automobile accidents, increased disciplinary problems, impaired judgment, increased 13 suicidal thinking, increased levels of anxiety and depression, decreased motivation, 14 increased substance abuse, and other negative consequences; and

WHEREAS, the community can support parents and families to ensure that adolescents get appropriate sleep by adjusting school schedules; even small changes to school start times can result in significant improvements to student health and academic performance; and

WHEREAS, school districts have flexibility in setting calendars and school start
times and would benefit from an analysis of how later school start times may benefit
students, including research on best practices from other states; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate that the impact of school start times on student healthand performance receive a thorough evaluation.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby create a task force and urge and request the state Department of Education to conduct a comprehensive study on school start times and submit written reports of findings and recommendations to the House Committee on Education and the Senate Committee on Education not later than February 1, 2025.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force shall be composed of thefollowing members:

1	(1) The state superintendent of education or his designee.
2	(2) The president of the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education or his
3	designee.
4	(3) One member appointed by the chief executive officer of the Baton Rouge Area
5	Chamber.
6	(4) One member appointed by the president of the Council for a Better Louisiana.
7	(5) One member appointed by the president of the Louisiana Association of Business
8	and Industry.
9	(6) One member appointed by the president of the Louisiana Association of
10	Educators.
11	(7) One member appointed by the executive director of the Louisiana District
12	Attorneys Association.
13	(8) One member appointed by the president of the Louisiana Federation of Teachers.
14	(9) One member appointed by the executive director of the Louisiana School Boards
15	Association.
16	(10) One member appointed by the executive director of the Louisiana School
17	Superintendents Association.
18	(11) One member appointed by the president of the Public Affairs Research Council
19	of Louisiana.
20	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the member appointed by the chief executive
21	officer of the Baton Rouge Area Chamber shall chair the task force and shall call the first
22	meeting no later than August 30, 2024.
23	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force and department shall
24	simultaneously do the following:
25	(1) Evaluate school start times across the state with a particular focus on middle and
26	high schools.
27	(2) Assess potential benefits and challenges associated with later school start times,
28	including impacts on student achievement, truancy, chronic absenteeism, and student health
29	and well-being.

1 (3) Examine the scientific evidence regarding adolescent sleep needs and the impact 2 of school start times on sleep. 3 (4) Explore the logistical, financial, and community implications of adjusting school 4 start times. 5 (5) Engage and consult with stakeholders, including students, parents, educators, and 6 community members, to gather diverse perspectives and insights on the issue. 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force's and department's reports shall 8 respectively include a comprehensive overview of findings, recommendations for potential 9 adjustments to school start times, and proposed strategies for implementing any 10 recommended changes and shall address potential challenges and outline steps for successful 11 transition. 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to the 13 president of the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education and the state 14 superintendent of education.
