Substitute for Original House Bill No. 101 by Representative Muscarello as proposed by the House Committee on Administration of Criminal Justice

To repeal R.S. 15:572.8, relative to compensation for wrongful conviction and imprisonment, to repeal provisions relative to compensation for wrongful conviction and imprisonment and the Innocence Compensation Fund; and to provide for related matters.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

Section 1. R.S. 15:572.8 is hereby repealed in its entirety.

**Abstract:** Repeals provisions relative to compensation for wrongful conviction and imprisonment.

<u>Present law</u> provides that a person is entitled to compensation for wrongful conviction when his conviction has been reversed or vacated, and he has proven his innocence through clear and convincing evidence.

<u>Present law</u> provides that during a contradictory hearing, the court may consider any relevant evidence, whether it was admissible in or excluded from the criminal trial.

<u>Present law</u> provides that the attorney general shall represent the state of Louisiana in such proceedings.

<u>Present law</u> requires that notice of the petition be sent to the attorney general's office.

<u>Present law</u> provides that compensation for a wrongful conviction shall be paid from the Innocence Compensation Fund.

<u>Present law</u> provides that petitions based on convictions involving willful misconduct by the state are not limited to the recovery provided in <u>present law</u>.

Proposed law repeals present law.
