**Abstract:** Relative to parish ordinances in St. Bernard Parish, increases the maximum penalties for the violation of such ordinances.

<u>Present law</u> provides that the penalty that may be imposed for a violation of a parish ordinance is a \$500 fine and imprisonment of 30 days in the parish jail. Provides that the maximum penalty that may be imposed for the violation of certain ordinances in East Baton Rouge Parish is a \$1,000 fine and imprisonment of six months in the parish jail. Further provides that in Jefferson Parish, except for properties zoned or used for industrial activities, the maximum penalty that may be imposed for a violation of a parish ordinance is a \$1,000 fine and imprisonment of six months in the parish jail. Provides further with respect to penalties for the violation of other ordinances, including those that provide for properties zoned or used for industrial activities.

<u>Present law</u> authorizes the imposition of a civil penalty not to exceed \$1,000 a day for each violation of certain waste treatment ordinances. Additionally authorizes the imposition of up to 100 hours of community service, in addition to, or in lieu of, penalties authorized by <u>present law</u> for a violation of a parish ordinance.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> and additionally provides an exception for St. Bernard Parish. Provides that the maximum penalty that may be imposed for the violation of a parish ordinance is a \$1,500 fine and imprisonment of three months in the parish jail.

## Summary of Amendments Adopted by House

The Committee Amendments Proposed by <u>House Committee on Municipal, Parochial and Cultural Affairs</u> to the <u>original</u> bill:

1. Reduce the maximum time of imprisonment for an ordinance violation in <u>proposed law</u> from six months to three months.
