APPROPRIATIONS: Appropriates funds for the expenses of the judiciary for Fiscal Year 2025-2026

AN ACT

2 To appropriate funds to defray the expenses of the Louisiana Judiciary, including the 3 Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, District Courts, Criminal District Court of Orleans 4 Parish, and other courts; to provide for an effective date; and to provide for related 5 matters. 6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: 7 Section 1.A. The sum of Two Hundred Twenty Million Four Hundred Twenty-Four 8 Thousand Seven Hundred Eleven Dollars and No/100 (\$220,424,711) Dollars, or so much 9 thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of the judiciary, 10 including the Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, the District Courts, the Criminal District 11 Court of Orleans Parish, and of the other courts. 12 B. The total amount herein appropriated is hereby allocated to provide as follows: 13 03-8170 SUPREME COURT 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 **Program Description:** The Supreme Court has general supervisory jurisdiction over all lower courts. It may establish procedural and administrative rules not in conflict with law and may assign a sitting or retired judge to any court. The Supreme Court has sole authority to provide by rule for appointments of attorneys as temporary or ad hoc judges. It considers applications for writs to review individual cases, and has criminal and other appellate jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has exclusive original jurisdiction of disciplinary proceedings against lawyers, recommendations of the Judiciary Commission of Louisiana for the discipline of judges, and fact questions affecting its appellate jurisdiction. It has inherent authority to regulate the legal profession and to promulgate and update the Code of Judicial Conduct. Through the Judicial Council, it performs studies and makes recommendations for the creation of new judgeships and for improving the administration of justice. The Judicial Administrator's Office provides payroll and other fiscal services to the Judiciary, including the administration of a judicial retirement system; support for the Supreme Court and Appellate Court human resource system; and support for judicial branch reporting obligations. The Judicial Administrator's Office also manages the ad hoc judgeship system, monitors cases under advisement, provides support for initiatives to ensure access to the courts for limited English proficiency individuals; provides outreach services to state and local courts, applies for and administers grants to improve judicial administration; and staffs the Committee on Judicial Ethics. The Judicial Administrator's office administers several programs, including the Supreme Court Drug Court / Specialty Court Office, the Louisiana Protective Order Registry, and CASA and FINS through the Division of Children and Families. The Judicial Administrator's office also provides staff support for the Louisiana Judicial College, and performs numerous legal services for the Supreme Court and the Judiciary. 27 B. - B. The funds drawn as provided herein shall be deposited in the name of the judiciary
- 5 in an approved bank that has been selected by the Supreme Court and is located in the state.
- 6 C. Any funds herein allocated to the judiciary, any portion of the funds previously
- 7 appropriated to the judiciary, other revenue of the judiciary or its agencies, and interest
- 8 earnings are hereby appropriated and may be used to defray the expenses of the judiciary;
- 9 however, all funds remaining unexpended or unencumbered shall be returnable to the State
- General Fund on or before September 1, 2025.
- D. For Fiscal Year 2025-2026, any surpluses occurring in the appropriations made in
- 12 this Act may be transferred from one agency or line-item to another during the fiscal year
- in accordance with the rules of the Judicial Budgetary Control Board, or as approved by the
- 14 Supreme Court.
- 15 E. The adjustment to be made in the salaries of judicial employees and the number of
- authorized positions of the judiciary shall be as decided by the judicial agency affected,
- subject to the approval of the Judicial Budgetary Control Board, or as approved by the
- 18 Supreme Court.
- F. The program descriptions contained in this Act are not part of the law and are not
- 20 enacted into law by virtue of their inclusion in this Act.
- G. The inclusion in this Act of staff salaries and benefits for lower court or other judicial
- branch agency employees shall not be deemed to create or impose any obligation upon the
- 23 State of Louisiana Judicial Branch, the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the Judicial Budgetary
- 24 Control Board, or the Supreme Court Judicial Administrator's Office relative to the
- administration of pay, retirement, or other benefits to any such employees. Accordingly, the
- 26 State of Louisiana Judicial Branch, the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the Judicial Budgetary
- 27 Control Board, and the Supreme Court Judicial Administrator's Office are not to be
- considered the "employer" or "employing agency" of lower court or other judicial agency
- employees whose staff salaries and other benefits are included in this Act.

- 3 of Eleven Million Eight Hundred Seventy-Three Thousand Three Hundred Eighty-Two
- 4 (\$11,873,382) Dollars, pursuant to a plan adopted by the Judicial Budgetary Control Board
- 5 or as approved by the Louisiana Supreme Court.
- 6 Section 4. The appropriations, and the allocations of such appropriations, from the State
- 7 General Fund (Direct) contained in Section 1 of this Act shall be increased by a total amount

- 9 Hundred Ninety Thousand (\$390,000) Dollars for Court Appointed Special Advocates; and
- One Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$150,000) Dollars for Families in Need of Services.
- 11 Section 5. This Act shall become effective on July 1, 2025; if vetoed by the governor
- and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become effective on July 1,
- 13 2025, or on the day following such approval by the legislature, whichever is later.
