LEGIS POWERS/FUNCTIONS. Designates Sazerac as the official state cocktail. (gov sig)

1	AN ACT
2	To enact R.S. 49:170.15, relative to state symbols; to designate the Sazerac as the official
3	state cocktail; and to provide for related matters.
4	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
5	Section 1. R.S. 49:170.15 is hereby enacted to read as follows:
6	<u>§170.15. State cocktail</u>
7	There shall be an official state cocktail. The official state cocktail shall
8	be the Sazerac. The Sazerac, created in the nineteenth century by Antoine
9	Amedee Peychaud in the French Quarter of New Orleans, is world known for
10	the use of a local product known as "Peychaud's Bitters." Its use on official
11	documents of the state and with the insignia of the state is hereby authorized.
12	Section 2. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor
13	or, if not signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law
14	without signature by the governor, as provided by Article III, Section 18 of the
15	Constitution of Louisiana. If vetoed by the governor and subsequently approved by
16	the legislature, this Act shall become effective on the day following such approval.
