## HOUSE SUMMARY OF SENATE AMENDMENTS

House Bill No. 155 by Representative Hardy

CRIME: Amends the definition of negligent injuring and negligent homicide to include attacks by dogs or other animals

## **Synopsis of Senate Amendments**

- 1. Requires owner to be reckless in addition to criminally negligent.
- 2. Adds prohibition against denial of liability coverage when criminal conduct is due to the criminally negligent ownership or handling of a dog or other animal.

## Digest of Bill as Finally Passed by Senate

<u>Present law</u> provides that negligent homicide is the killing of a human being by criminal negligence.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains the provisions of <u>present law</u> and further provides that negligent homicide is the killing of a human being by a dog or other animal when the owner is reckless and criminally negligent in confining or restraining the dog or other animal.

<u>Present law</u> provides that negligent injuring is the inflicting of any injury upon the person of another by criminal negligence.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains the provisions of <u>present law</u> and further provides that negligent injuring is the inflicting of any injury upon the person of another by a dog or other animal when the owner is criminally negligent in confining or restraining the dog or other animal.

<u>Proposed law</u> defines "owner", "harboring or keeping", and "livestock".

<u>Proposed law</u> provides exceptions for law enforcement dogs, dogs involved in search and rescue, guide and service dogs, dogs inside a dwelling, place of business, or motor vehicle who attack a person who is attempting or who has made an unlawful entry, and attacks made by livestock.

<u>Proposed law</u> prohibits the denial of liability insurance coverage when the activity is due to the criminally negligent ownership or handling of a dog pursuant to <u>proposed law</u>.
