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Guinn HB No. 373

Abstract: Lowers the minimum age to enter pre-K <u>from</u> four <u>to</u> three, authorizes certain nonpublic schools to offer pre-K, and requires that a child be at least six to enter first grade at certain nonpublic schools.

Prekindergarten:

<u>Present law</u> authorizes public school boards to develop and offer prekindergarten instruction (pre-K). <u>Proposed law</u> additionally grants this authority to approved nonpublic elementary schools.

<u>Present law</u> provides that the minimum age for entrance into pre-K is two years younger than the minimum age to enter first grade. <u>Present law</u> requires a child to be six on or before Sept. 30th of the calendar year when the school year starts to enter first grade, so a child may enter pre-K at the age of four according to <u>present law</u>.

<u>Proposed law</u>, for both public and approved nonpublic schools, provides that the minimum age for pre-K entrance shall be three years younger than the minimum age to enter first grade, thus providing that a child may enter pre-K at the age of three.

First grade:

<u>Present law</u> (R.S. 17:222(A)) requires a child to be six years old on or before Sept. 30 of the calendar year in which the school year begins to enter first grade at any public school. <u>Proposed law</u> applies this same age requirement to first grade entrance at any approved nonpublic elementary school.

<u>Present law</u> (R.S. 17:222(C)(1) and (2)) provides for an exception to the first grade minimum age requirement through the 1995-1996 school year. <u>Proposed law</u> deletes <u>present law</u>.
