The original instrument and the following digest, which constitutes no part of the legislative instrument, were prepared by Cathy Wells.

## **DIGEST**

<u>Present law</u> requires an oil spill contingency plan of response for actual or threatened unauthorized discharges of oil and clean up of pollution of such discharges. <u>Present law</u> requires pre-approval for the use of dispersants.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> and further requires dispersants that are used to meet the following criteria:

- (1) Be listed on the National Oil and Hazardous Substances Pollution Contingency Plan (NCP) Subpart J Product Schedule.
- (2) Be classified as "Practically Non-Toxic" as defined by the EPA Ecotoxicity Categories for Aquatic Organisms (LC50 > 100 ppm), as determined using the standard toxicity test methods described in Appendix C to 40 CRF Part 300 (NCP Subpart J: Use of Dispersants and Other Chemicals 40 CRF 300.900 300.920).
- (3) Have substantiated end-point of carbon dioxide and water.
