2 To enact R.S. 37:1291.1, relative to out-of-state physician orders; to provide for an out-of-3 state physician to order diagnostic tests under certain conditions; to provide for definitions; and to provide for related matters. 4 5 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: 6 Section 1. R.S. 37:1291.1 is hereby enacted to read as follows: 7 §1291.1. Out-of-state physician orders 8 A. The board may adopt rules, in accordance with the Administrative 9 Procedure Act, exempting application of this Part to an out-of-state physician 10 who orders routine diagnostic testing for an established patient, provided the 11 physician-patient relationship was initiated through an in-person, face-to-face visit with the physician in another state, the order can be verified, and the 12 13 results of all testing are provided directly to the ordering out-of-state physician. A health care facility or provider that is presented such an order may choose 14 15 not to recognize such an order. B. For the purposes of this Section, "out-of-state physician" means a 16 physician who is duly licensed to practice medicine in any state or jurisdiction 17

in the United States other than Louisiana.
