PRESCRIPTION: Provides for a liberative prescriptive period of two years

AN ACT

2 To amend and reenact Civil Code Article 3493.10 and to repeal Civil Code Article 3492, 3 relative to liberative prescription; to provide for a two-year liberative prescriptive 4 period for delictual actions; to repeal the one-year prescriptive period for delictual 5 actions; to provide for a contingent effective date; and to provide for related matters. 6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: 7 Section 1. Civil Code Article 3493.10 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as 8 follows: 9 Art. 3493.10. Delictual actions; two-year prescription; criminal act 10 Delictual actions which arise due to damages sustained as a result of an act 11 defined as a crime of violence under Chapter 1 of Title 14 of the Louisiana Revised 12 Statutes of 1950 are subject to a liberative prescription of two years. This 13 prescription commences to run from the day injury or damage is sustained. <u>It does</u> 14 not run against minors or interdicts in actions involving permanent disability and 15 brought pursuant to the Louisiana Products Liability Act or state law governing 16 product liability actions in effect at the time of the injury or damage. 17 Section 2. Civil Code Article 3492 is hereby repealed in its entirety. 18 Section 3. It is the intent of the legislature that this Act and the Act which originated 19 as House Bill 89 of the 2016 Regular Session shall both become effective or neither of them 20 shall become effective. This Act and the Act which originated as House Bill 89 of this 2016

- 1 Regular Session shall become effective only if both this Act and the Act which originated
- 2 as House Bill 89 of this 2016 Regular Session are enacted by the legislature and are signed

**Abstract:** Changes the one-year liberative prescriptive period for delictual actions to a two-year prescriptive period.

<u>Present law</u> provides a general one-year liberative prescriptive period for delictual actions (C.C. Art. 3492), and a two-year period for delictual actions for damages arising from an act defined as a crime of violence (C.C. Art. 3493.10).

<u>Present law</u> (R.S. 9:5628) provides a special one-year prescriptive period for medical malpractice actions.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains the <u>present law</u> one-year prescriptive period with respect to medical malpractice actions pursuant to R.S. 9:5628.

<u>Proposed law</u> increases the general one-year prescriptive period for delictual actions to a two-year prescriptive period.

The effective date of <u>proposed law</u> is contingent upon the passage of House Bill 89 of this 2016 Regular Session, and the effective date of House Bill 89 of this 2016 Regular Session is contingent upon the passage of this legislation.
