VIDEO POKER. Provides relative to revocation of a video draw poker device license for certain violations. (8/1/16)

2	To amend and reenact R.S. 27:443(B)(1)(a)(ii) and (b)(iii), relative to penalties for certain
3	violations of the Video Draw Poker Devices Control Law; to provide with respect
4	to the revocation or suspension of a license for certain violations; to provide for a
5	hearing; and to provide for related matters.
6	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
7	Section 1. R.S. 27:443(B)(1)(a)(ii) and (b)(iii) are hereby amended and reenacted to
8	read as follows:
9	§443. Allowing underage persons to play video draw poker devices; penalties;
10	revocation of license hearing

12	B.(1) Violations of Subsection A of this Section shall be penalized by the
13	division as follows:
14	(a) For allowing a person under the age of twenty-one to play or operate a
15	video draw poker device at a licensed establishment, unless the licensee, his
16	employee, or agent reasonably believed that the person was twenty-one years old or
17	older:

2	(ii) For a third or subsequent violation, <u>a</u> license revocation <u>hearing</u> shall be
3	conducted at which time the board shall determine whether or not there are
4	extenuating circumstances pursuant to which a license suspension or revocation
5	should not be imposed. At the conclusion of the hearing, the board may revoke
6	or suspend a license or impose a fine pursuant to R.S. 27:15(F).
7	(b) For allowing a person under the age of twenty-one to play or operate a
8	video draw poker device at a licensed establishment when the licensee, his employee,
9	or agent is shown to have known or reasonably believed he was allowing a person
10	under the age of twenty-one years old to play or operate a video draw poker device,
11	or for allowing a person under the age fifteen years old to play or operate a video
12	draw poker device at a licensed establishment regardless of what the licensee, his
13	employee or agent knew or reasonably believed about the age of that person:
14	* * *
15	(iii) For a third or subsequent violation, $\underline{\mathbf{a}}$ license revocation $\underline{\mathbf{hearing}}$ shall
16	be conducted at which time the board shall determine whether or not there are
17	extenuating circumstances pursuant to which a license suspension or revocation
18	should not be imposed. At the conclusion of the hearing, the board may revoke
19	or suspend a license or impose a fine pursuant to R.S. 27:15(F).

Present law provides for the operation of video draw poker devices at qualified truck stops.

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Present law provides a licensee will be penalized for allowing a person under the age of 21 to play or operate a video draw poker device at a licensed establishment, unless the licensee, his employee, or agent reasonably believed that the person was 21 years old or older.

Present law prohibits a licensee to allow a person under 21 to play or operate a video draw poker device when the licensee, his employee, or agent is shown to have known or reasonably believed he was allowing a person under 21 to operate or play the video draw poker device.

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<u>Present law</u> further prohibits a licensee to allow a person under 15 to play or operate a video draw poker device regardless of what the licensee, his employee, or agent knew or reasonably believed about the age of the person.

<u>Present law</u> provides the penalty for the third or subsequent violation of either offense will be the revocation of the licensee's video draw poker license.

<u>Proposed law</u> removes the automatic revocation penalty for a third or subsequent offense and provides a hearing is to be conducted by the Gaming Control Board to determine if extenuating circumstances are present pursuant to which a license suspension or revocation should not be imposed.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that at the conclusion of the hearing the board may revoke or suspend a license or impose a fine on the licensee.

Effective August 1, 2016.

Summary of Amendments Adopted by Senate

Committee Amendments Proposed by Senate Committee on Judiciary B to the original bill

1. Adds authority for the Gaming Control Board, at the conclusion of a revocation hearing, to revoke or suspend a license or impose a fine on the licensee.
