Paragraph (1) of this Subsection, but shall notify the board when a contract has been let."

"A.(1) If a building has met the occupancy requirements as a home, commercial establishment, or other classification of occupancy, then the use, rental, lease, or otherwise lawful possession of the building, whether in whole or in part, by a parent-driven learning microschool shall not alter or change the zoning or occupancy classification of the building or subject the building to any additional building code requirements or fire safety regulations due to the fact that parents are making use of all or part of the building as a parent-driven learning microschool.
(2) No governmental agency shall take any of the following actions against a parent who participates in a parent-driven learning microschool or against the parent-driven learning microschool:
(a) Restrict or deny the use of the building by parents or children, regardless of age, for the same or similar purposes as provided in R.S. 13:5233.1(A)(4), regardless of the day of the week, time, or number of hours of the day, or require compliance with Part X-B of Chapter 1 of this Title or any other provision of this Title.
(b) Require that a parent-driven learning microschool register or otherwise report to any governmental agency.
B. As used in this Section, the following definitions shall apply:
(1) "Governmental agency" shall have the same meaning as "government" or "governmental agency" as defined in R.S. 13:5234.
(2) "Parent-driven learning microschool" means a voluntary association of parents who choose to group their children together, regardless of age, for educational or instructional activities conducted at mutually agreed-upon times and days, and which may include compensated or uncompensated parents, tutors, or instructors, for the purpose of providing a personalized learning experience for each student, and that meets all of the following requirements:"

(5) "Covered services" means the provision, without compensation from the recipient, of food, water, clothing, hygiene supplies, sanitation, transportation, basic medical or first-aid services, mental health or substance use counseling or referral, harm-reduction supplies and education to the extent permitted by law, legal aid, employment or housing navigation, religious or pastoral counseling, and childcare services to persons experiencing homelessness on or in connection with a designated property.

B. Discretionary act immunity. The exercise or non exercise of any duty, power, or function of a covered entity under this Part or under R.S. 14:107.6, including the decision to designate, refuse to designate, close, or non renew a designation; the adoption and enforcement of minimum standards under R.S. 40:581.2(C); the removal or relocation of persons or property; the provision of or referral to services; and the response to a notice from the Louisiana Department of Health, is a policymaking or discretionary act within the meaning of R.S. 9:2798.1, and the immunity provided by that Section shall apply.

C. Premises immunity. A covered entity that designates, owns, leases, manages, controls, or supervises a designated property shall be deemed an owner of land used for purposes equivalent to recreational purposes within the meaning of R.S. 9:2795, and the limitation of liability provided by R.S. 9:2795(B) and (E) shall apply to the designated property. The immunity extended by this Subsection includes, without limitation, claims for personal injury, illness, death, or property damage arising from fire, explosion, smoke inhalation, drug or alcohol overdose, communicable disease, exposure to weather, defects in the land or facilities, or the acts or omissions of any other camper, guest, vendor, service provider, volunteer, or third person on the designated property.

D. Service provider and volunteer immunity. A service provider, and any volunteer, who in good faith and without compensation provides covered services shall be deemed to be rendering service within the meaning of R.S. 9:2793, and the immunity provided by that Section shall apply, except that the immunity extended by this Subsection is not limited to emergency settings. This Subsection is in addition to, and does not limit, any greater protection available under R.S. 9:2793.1; 2799, or 2799.1, the federal Volunteer Protection Act of 1997 (42 U.S.C. 14501 et seq.), or the federal Bill Emerson Good Samaritan Food Donation Act (42 U.S.C. 1791).

E. Property removal and storage. Personal property of a person experiencing homelessness that is removed from public property in connection with enforcement of this Part or R.S. 14:107.6 shall be stored for not less than thirty days and returned to the owner upon request, in accordance with procedures adopted by the covered entity. A covered entity is not liable for property unclaimed after the storage period, or for property that is contaminated or perishable or constitutes a public health or safety hazard, when disposal is consistent with adopted procedures.

F. Federal and constitutional claims. Nothing in this Section limits any claim arising under the Constitution of Louisiana, the Constitution of the United States, or 42 U.S.C. 1983.
